WATERINGBURY CROSSROADS. URGENT ACTION NEEDED

Dear Resident

As we are sure you are aware the problems Wateringbury experiences daily from excessive traffic have been under investigation in terms of safety improvements, particularly for pedestrians on Bow Road and the A26 at the junction with Old Road, and the environmental problems from vehicles driving through our Village and idling in queues. There are initiatives and improvement plans currently being developed with the Parish Council, which is to be consulted upon with the Residents, the Borough Councillor and many interested and concerned residents. The problems are quite complex and suitable solutions for the long term are being sought.

Most homes in Wateringbury by now should have received a flyer from Sarah supported by the Parish Council,

asking for Residents to write to the KCC, copying in Sarah and the Parish Clerk, objecting to proposed modifications of Wateringbury Crossroads who are proposing installing second lanes on the approach roads where the existing pavement is wide enough.

The cross roads area has been improved recently by the replanting of the flowerbeds, the creation of the 'living wall' with plants that absorb some vehicle fumes, the maintenance of the stocks and the lock up and the most recent addition of the 'Red box' lending library. We think we all consider this improvement in amenity important to the Village and not one we would like to lose.

If these proposed crossroads modification proceed, which are mentioned as enabling greater traffic flows in three development planning applications, then we will lose permanently this amenity improvement in the heart of a historic Kent Village.

There is considerable effort from your Borough Councillor working with Wateringbury Parish Council on traffic calming and possibly certain traffic restriction to ensure our quality of life in the Village is maintained and improved. Inevitably commercial and residential developments locally will impact adversely on Wateringbury traffic flows and consequent problems if we cannot mitigate them. We cannot hope to remove all the problems but seek better risk improvement solutions and will press the County and Borough in these important tasks for the Village and its community.

Please support your Councillors, oppose these cross roads modifications, and we will keep you updated through the existing methods and Rostrum. Thanks and kind regards Sarah Hudson Borough Councillor and Wateringbury Parish Council

NEWS FROM OUR MP TOM TUGENHATT

On 6 May 2021, we will be asked to elect our Police and Crime Commissioner and Kent County Councillor in the first set of elections since I was privileged to have been elected as your MP in December 2019. All elections are important, they are the opportunity for each of us to have our say on how we are represented.

This set of elections will be very different. I know many will not feel comfortable heading out to vote as you did before. That's why I wanted to use this column to emphasise the importance of having your voice heard, and applying for a postal vote if you feel uncomfortable. Postal voting is quick and easy. You receive your ballot paper a couple of weeks before the election, fill it in at home and return in the freepost envelope supplied. It doesn't cost anything, and can be posted while getting some fresh air in the spring weather. We know our elections matter. Please do make sure you have your views heard, and participate in our democracy. It relies on people voting at every opportunity and I hope you'll have your say this year.

EVER WONDERED WHAT HAPPENS TO OUR FOOD WASTE?

Its worth taking the time to separate food waste into your food caddy. It is taken to Blaise Farm Quarry,

near Kings Hill and turned into compost to improve the quality of soil on local farms. 45,000 tons of food waste is collected annually from Kent households. Soon the waste will be turned into biogas at a new anaerobic digester at Blaise Farm. The biogas will be fed diretly into the National Grid as well as powering the plant itself and creating farm fertiliser. KCC expect around 5 million m3 of gas will be created alongside 5.2 million kWh of electricity, enough to power around 3,600 homes. The plant has room to expand as the local need increases.

NEWS FROM OUR BOROUGH COUNCILLOR SARAH HUDSON

Every 15 years or so, the Government asks the Borough Council to produce a "Local Plan" which allocates land for a variety of uses such as housing, employment, retail, commercial and infrastructure. The most controversial part of this process is usually allocating housing because not only is there pressure to meet housing targets handed down by the Govt, but in a "constrained" area like TMBC this means considering whether to allow development on greenfield sites, or even in the Green Belt. Nevertheless. TMBC submitted its plan to the Government for approval in January 2019. Local Plans are approved by the Planning Inspectorate, an executive agency of the Government, but the Inspectorate have halted the process as they believe that TMBC did not do enough in terms of the "Duty to Cooperate" with neighbouring Sevenoaks. Their specific complaint is that TMBC did not work closely enough with Sevenoaks District Council to see if the housing need of Sevenoaks could be met in Tonbridge & Malling. TMBC proposed to fully meet their own housing needs, and so to expect a council to volunteer to allocate land for potentially thousands of extra homes on behalf of its neighbours seems incredibly unfair. It is doubly ironic to delay the process at this stage given that the Government have recognised that the Duty to Cooperate is virtually inoperable, and they propose to scrap it. Therefore, TMBC have appealed to the Secretary of State to intervene and instruct the Inspectorate to continue the process. If this appeal is not successful, then TMBC will need to draft a new plan, but any new plan would need to use the latest set of government housing targets, which are even higher than when the current plan was drawn up! We can only hope that the Secretary of State sees sense, or it will just put more pressure on our precious countryside.

56.1% of resident waste is now recycled making TMBC the top Borough in Kent, and No. 7 out of the UK for recycling improvement, based on latest DEFRA figures. Increased collections based on pre COVID times are: +78% plastic, cans etc, +47% Residual waste, +37% Paper, card +70% Garden waste.

The flooding at the entrance to The Orpines is soon

to be resolved, with Jenners paying for a new soakaway to be installed.

There will be <u>NO</u> Community Fridge on Friday 2nd April, as it is Good Friday. As the end to lockdown approaches, it is anticipated that the number of residents attending will reduce and so therefore will the supplies of bought food. Donations will still be collected every week from the local supermarkets. From 16th April, there will no longer need to be pre-allocated timeslots, but it would help in terms of ensuring sufficient provision, that residents still advise that they wish to attend through the Community Fridge Facebook page.

Community Library - We have enough book donations to last a while, so please no more for the time being. It is really pleasing to see the facility so well used and supported. *Best Wishes, Sarah*

MARCH PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Co-option of Patrick Gregson to Parish Council at the start of the meeting Patrick Gregson was co-opted on to the Council.

Flood Warden the chairman was pleased to announce that Geraint Owen had volunteered to be our village flood warden.

Borough Councillor Sarah Hudson reported that at recent full T & M council meeting it was decided to raise the precept by 4.9%. This would mean a property in band D would pay £5 a year extra which she felt was good value for money.

The lamp columns owned by KCC were scheduled to be repaired by end of June (these are on the A26 and Bow Road/Red Hill).

The relocation of the soakaway on the A26 near The Orpines which had caused flooding in recent times was under review.

The KCC have asked Sarah's opinion as to the order of priority which should be placed upon the 7 suggested improvements to the A26. Sarah requested help from the Parish Council in prioritising these schemes. The chairman read out a prepared statement that the Parish Council did not feel able to make decisions until they had seen the estimated costings for each proposal. It is not certain what funding will be available as a decision on the application for £125,000 was dependent the Kent County Council's budget. No scheme can proceed unless funds are allocated). At the public forum the safety of village roads was the topic of lively debate.

Virtual meeting with Kent's Police and Crime Commissioner, Matthew Scott. Councillor Patrick Gregson volunteered to represent the Parish Council and book an on-line appointment on 4th March with the Commissioner. He was asked by a resident to ascertain the official police position regarding the use of speed cameras since the village have been led to believe that we cannot have these at our traffic lights, where frequently motorists jump red lights, and to deter speeding vehicles on A26 and Bow Road because of police objections.

Our new PCSO, whom we share with several villages, is Joshua Vincent.

Crime report Only one incident has been reported when 2 men and a woman were seen leaving a property in Cobbs Close with boxes. Police are not sure if a crime has been committed.

Playing Fields Andrew French Fencing's estimate to repair the chestnut fencing was accepted. The track from

Fields Lane is to be inspected regarding repairs to potholes. The estimate from Playdale for parts for play equipment was accepted.

Cemetery An estimate for repairs and a plaque at the grave of Tom Smith, the only WWI casualty buried in the cemetery, had been received from Viners. The clerk was asked to obtain 2 more quotes.

Cemetery Terms and Conditions A review had been made of the terms and conditions for cemetery plots. It was agreed that reservation of plots could only be for a named person. If a plot is not used within 25 yrs there are no continuing rights relating to that plot. At any time, up to the end of the reservation period the person reserving has the right to purchase the plot, at the then current price for the interment of the named person. These conditions do not affect the existing 18 reservations

Highways Committee One resident, Martin Millar, had expressed his willingness to help co-ordinate the comments and suggestions being received from residents on A26.

Planning Applications No applications had been received

Allotments An inspection had been carried out and it was reported that some of the neglected plots had been spruced up.

The next Meeting of the Parish Council will take place via Zoom on Tuesday 6th April at 7.30pm Councillors value the support of residents and the final item on each meeting's agenda is an Open Forum when matters of local concern can be raised and discussed. The Seven Proposals from KCC for improving Wateringbury's roads as identified on the Parish Council's Facebook page

- 1 There is a proposed 50mph buffer between National speed limit and 30mph approaching the village entrance. The Parish Council will promote for a 40mph buffer not 50mph (*Rostrum believes this is coming from Mereworth into the village*)
- 2 Enhancing and refreshing the existing village gateway feature
- 3 Potential Pedestrian crossing point at Old Road junction
- 4 Potential traffic calming island west of Canon Lane
- 5 Footway camber alterations opposite Old Road, down to the church
- 6 Potential installation of traffic calming islands outside and east of St John the Baptist church
- 7 White lining outside the church to visually narrow the carriageway.

On their Facebook page the Parish Council is asking residents to let them know their order of priority for the above proposals so these can be put forward to KCC. Please put your preferences in order and send to <u>clerk@wateringburypc.org.uk</u> as soon as possible

The above is dependent upon necessary funding being made available to KCC. It is separate to the Highway Improvement Plan that the Parish Council will put forward following consultation with residents which is at present being formulated for discussion.

We must not let our guard down or forget that for many this virus continues to put a huge strain on them physically, mentally, and emotionally. Another guard that can be let down is faith. HYMNS?

Can you remember what they are? For Hilary (organist) and Barry (choir master) it's far too long since any have been sung at St John the Baptist church but here's a way to get those tunes back into your minds. The inspiration comes from Barry's liking for translating hymn words to different contexts.

A prime example of that is the line 'transport of delight'. It is the title of a witty song by Flanders and Swan (some of you may remember them) about the London Bus.

WATERINGBURY'S FORGOTTEN PAST

The 24th April 2021 will mark the centenary of the

dedication of the village war memorials. Both memorials were unveiled by Maj Gen Sir Arthur Lynden-Bell, KCB, KCMG and dedicated by the Bishop of Rochester The Right Rev John Reginald Harmer, DD. The Memorial Shrine in the Church contains a wooden wall mounted memorial with the names of the fallen. It was carved by Mr Cecil French, a local master craftsman, whose workshop was at the local blacksmith's shop (now part of the car showroom in Bow Road).



The church bells were rung and

church doors opened at 2.45pm Ex-servicemen formed a guard of honour for the General up to the church for the Service which began at 3.15pm.

After the church service, there was a procession to the Cross Roads in this order: Wolf Cubs, Girl Guides, Girls' School, Boys' School, The Choir, Scout Master, Scouts and Scouts Band (who were playing on march), Buglers, The General, Ex-Service Men, Church Sidesmen, The Mourners, Churchwardens, The Bishop and Clergy, Sidesmen and lastly general Congregation.



The Memorial Cross was at the corner of Bow Road and A26. The Government of the time decreed that all memorials

were to be in prominent positions. Ours was moved to the churchyard in the 1970s when the cross roads' junction was widened. The Dedication Order of Ceremony tells us that it was "erected as a memorial of the dead and also as a witness to all future generations of the sacrifices made in the Great War by both the dead and the living". "The Chairman of Committee will entrust the Dedicated Memorial to the keeping of the Parish Council, and will hand the deed of Conveyance of the site to the Clerk for preservation in the council's archives." The land on which the Memorial Cross was erected was in the grounds of the then vicarage (now The White House).
