A wonderful husband and father, he will be missed dearly by all who knew and loved him.

## John Edward Childs - 21.09.51 - 23.06.23

John was born and grew up in St Paul's Cray. He met Janet when he was 21 and she was 19. They married in 1976 and moved to Old Road in Wateringbury. He worked hard on their cottage and they eventually purchased the adjoining property to create a beautiful home where they raised their family. (Jonathan was born in 1980 and Mary-Jo in 1983). John developed his building, planning, design and restoration business John Childs & Associates, which for many years advertised in Rostrum and had premises in the village (latterly at the station). John was always willing to give advice and nothing was too much trouble. In 2016 John and Janet left the village and moved to Whitstable. He will be remembered as a kind, thoughtful and generous man.

#### Sydney William Joseph Thompsett - 7.03.27 – 12.07.23

Syd died unexpectedly at the care home in Denham where he had enjoyed living over the past two years. Syd was born in Edenbridge and came to Wateringbury in 1947 to work in the surveyor's department of Wateringbury's Phoenix Brewery, part of the Whitbread group, He worked for Whitbread for 40 years, many based in Wateringbury but with wider geographic responsibilities, before retiring in 1987. He met his future wife, Vera (died 2016), at work, marrying in 1955. In 1967 they purchased land on Red Hill and designed the bungalow where they lived happily for many years. Syd was very active in village life. He played football for Wateringbury in a team which won the Maidstone Challenge Cup. He served on the Parochial Church Council and actively participated in church affairs. He took a keen interest in the work of the Parish Council. He founded the Wateringbury Footpath Group and was a founding member of Wateringbury Local History Society, subsequently serving as treasurer and chairman. He was a Trustee of Wateringbury Working Men's Club.

Syd's funeral took place in Wateringbury Church on 15th August and he is buried in the village cemetery.

## **Pizien Well Road**

Many Rostrum readers, while taking a walk in Pizien Well Road, have enjoyed the plants and areas created by Ted Shepherd and have stopped for a chat and expressed their thanks to him. But, as the result of recent correspondence from the landowner, he is no longer allowed to look after these plants and so it is likely that this area will revert over time to its untended state. He has also been obliged to remove the bench installed and to stop varnishing the seat.

Ted and his wife Paula are very disappointed and wanted Rostrum readers to know why the bench has been removed and Ted has stopped working there.

#### **Ukrainian Appeal**

The demand for items to help the Ukrainian people unfortunately continues. Desperately needed is dried and tinned food, bandages, plasters, antiseptics for the families, and particularly the children, devastated by the ongoing war. Also, men's and women's toiletries (sanitary products, shaving items, soap, toothbrushes and toothpaste etc.). Baby items - nappies, baby food, formula, dummies, etc. Families urgently need household items - saucepans, kitchen utensils, cooking equipment etc., etc. Also needed is animal food as well as medication i.e. flea, worm treatments, bandages, antiseptics etc.Sam, in Barming, has already made up over 1,000 shoeboxes which have been sent to Ukraine packed with goodies for children from toddlers to teenagers. She has another 200+ boxes to fill! Therefore, if you have any suitable items your children, teenagers, grandchildren have grown tired of; please 'recycle' them in this way! Small packets of sweets, biscuits, drinks can be included. In fact there are very few items not needed in order for the Ukrainians to maintain some normality in their war torn country. Every little helps.

Thank you so much for your amazing donations so far. They really are appreciated.

# WATERINGBURY FOOTPATH GROUP

Over the summer we had four walks on two different routes. In July our route took us up to the woods near Redhill Farm, where the public footpath had become rather overgrown as woodcutters had made their own route through the wood, breaking down a fence in the process. I had cut the brambles back so the walkers could take the official public right of way. I reminded them that the group had been started by Syd Thompsett more than 50 years ago in order that we regularly walk the official public right of way footpaths and don't lose them. Little did we know that Syd was to sadly pass away the day after I'd given this reminder when we were on the walk. Our walk took us on to the North Pole, down Livesey Street to Teston village and back to Wateringbury on the riverside walk.

In August we went along the riverside walk on the other bank, up through Tutsham and on up past polytunnels growing raspberries to admire the view at Shingle Barn on Smith's Hill. From there we took the tiny lane called Small Profits, down to Hunt Street, then continued downhill to Bow Meadow Cottages and back to Bow Bridge.

# GARDENING FOR WILDLIFE

The annual 'Big Butterfly Count' was due to take place between the last week of July and the first week of August. My first challenge was finding a dry, sunny day to undertake it but I managed to complete mine on the very last day and recorded; eleven 'Gatekeepers', four 'Large (Cabbage) Whites' and a few other species including a beautiful yellow 'Brimstone' and two 'Holly Blues'. A few moths were included this year and although I didn't see any on the day, we have recently sighted a beautiful 'Jersey Tiger Moth', which has black and white striped top wings and red lower wings and the extraordinary 'Hummingbird Hawk Moth'. This insect hovers (like a Hummingbird) in the air and uses its long proboscis to feed on tube shaped flowers such as Buddleia, Red Valerian and Honeysuckle.

Moths are often considered rather dull compared to Butterflies but these two species along with many others prove otherwise.

Many Moths and Butterflies along with some caterpillars and pupae, hibernate through the Winter, so if you can avoid tidying a small part of your garden, you may be rewarded in the Spring by an early sighting.

One of the exceptions to this rule is the 'Painted Lady' which migrates to North Africa. However, as our climate warms, it is thought that they may overwinter here instead, although after last Winter, they may well have changed their minds!

# NEWS FROM SARAH HUDSON, BOROUGH AND KCC COUNCILLOR, CHAIR OF PARISH COUNCIL

Just as July's Rostrum went to print, the Boundary Commission announced the final recommendations for the new constituencies of Tonbridge, and Maidstone & Malling. Wateringbury remains in Tonbridge, but Kings Hill, East and West Malling are now in Maidstone & Malling. These will take effect from the next election.

Budgetary pressures still exist at KCC, with Grant Thornton suggesting that we are facing an overspend of circa £86m this financial year. This is predominantly in Adult social care and children's services. Something radical needs to change, but should not be at the expense of services used by the majority of tax payers.

#### FROM TOM TUGENDHAT, OUR MP

Much has been said recently about the expansion of the Ultra Low Emissions Zone – ULEZ. This punishes those who need to get around, costs jobs and hurts families. London is the engine of the economy but this is a barrier to people working in and travelling to London from communities like ours.

The Mayor of London is also looking to scrap the popular Day Travelcards. These train tickets allow so many of us to travel into London for the day and have access to the tubes and buses throughout the capital. They can be incredibly valuable for families who would otherwise not be able to afford the full price,

During August, I invited everybody to fill out a petition on my website so that Sadiq Khan knows how important this is to us all. As a result, I also wrote to the Mayor of London passing on concerns of people across the community.

However, all is not lost just yet. The Mayor has made it clear that he is still open to reversing this. I would still be very interested to hear your thoughts on how this will impact you, so please feel free to either email me, or write to me.

This decision from the Mayor of London will impact many across our community. I am very grateful for everybody who took time to complete my petition.

# JULY PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

**Allotments** – Quotes will be obtained for the cutting back of the brambles and the removal of rubble.

**Cemetery** – A response is still awaited from the managing agents for Manor Farm regarding the trees which are overhanging the cemetery wall. The clerk was asked to contact them again.

**Crime Report** – The new Police Beat Officer, PC Levi Carvana, attended the meeting and introduced himself to those present. He will cover Wateringbury, Hadlow and East Peckham. There were no crimes reported on the Kent Police e.watch site. At the public

open session the question of e-scooters was raised. It is illegal for these to be used in public places, roads and pavements. PC Carvana said current police policy is that for the first incident of illegal use the user will be issued with a formal warning. A second offence will lead to the confiscation of the e-scooter.

**Village Defibrillators** - It was confirmed that systems were in place to keep the Emergency Services updated every 3 months as to their location so that in an emergency the access codes can be given by the 999 service.

**Finance** - The Parish Council bank account with NatWest has been closed and the new on-line account is now fully operational. The process to allow new councillors to become authorising signatories will now begin.

**Speed Watch** – Co-ordinator David Merry was given the speed gun which the Parish has purchased. This means that teams will be able to monitor and record the speed of vehicles travelling in both directions at each session. At the public open session a member of the public felt that the speed watch teams should operate on the Tonbridge Road on the east side of the traffic lights. It was explained that all speed watch sites have to be approved by the police and there was no safe site on the A26 before the parish boundary with Teston.

**Sports and Recreation Association** - A meeting had been arranged for Tuesday 18<sup>th</sup> July in the village hall upper room. The Parish Clerk will contact all organisations mentioned in the Charity's Trust deed asking them to send a representative to the meeting who will be prepared to serve on the management committee for the year to May 2024.

**Playing Fields** - A quote was accepted to weld the joints on the goal posts as this will reduce the need to pay for maintenance every year. The play equipment in the far corner near the station will be removed after the new equipment has been installed at the main play area. A quote was accepted to repair the gate catch to the play equipment area.

#### **Planning Applications**

<u>Councillors had no objections</u> to the following applications: **1 Bow Road** (*Hair Traditional Building*)- Roof replacement of the original building and chimney works (general and listed building applications).

**Home Farm, Red Hill** - installation of crop rain-protection system for existing top fruit orchards.

Objections were raised to the following applications:

**Wateringbury Station Goods Shed railings** – Large sign for timber merchants to be fixed to existing fencing. Objections were raised to the size of the proposed sign which would be out of keeping, and detract from, the nearby listed building.

**182, 184 and 186 A, B, C, D and E Tonbridge Road** *(junction of Red Hill and Tonbridge Road opposite side to Where Memories Meet)* – Conversion and extension of existing 4 x residential units to create 7 x residential units, with additional storey and alterations to the existing building facade. Objections were raised about the size of the proposed building and the lack of parking (the village car park is often full in the evenings). Councillors felt the proposal was totally out of keeping with the surroundings as the site is in the heart of the village and in the Conservation area. Vehicle access is very close to the traffic lights which could cause congestion problems. It is also in the area which has very high pollution levels which could be a health hazard.

The next meeting of the Parish Council is on Tuesday 5<sup>th</sup> September at 7.30pm in the Upper Room of the Village Hall. Approved minutes of council meetings will appear on the Parish Council website in due course <u>www.wateringburypc.org.uk</u>
