#### THE SWAN COMMUNITY PROJECT

The Swan on the Green has been part of West Peckham since 1685 and is a much loved asset to the community. Following the decision for the pub to be put up for sale, **West Peckham residents are now working hard on the proposal of turning the Swan on the Green into a community-owned pub.** So far the steering group has completed a round of pledges to give an indication on the funds we can raise and they hit an incredible £295,000.

Following this, the team have compiled an application for the Community Ownership Fund, a grant that if successful will add £250,000 to our fundraising. As part of the application, a business plan and share prospectus have been put together, which includes an outline for the financial and operational plans for the Swan, we plan to share this with the public.

**On 18<sup>th</sup> April at 7.30pm in West Peckham Village Hall** we will be holding an event where the team will lead a walk-through of these plans and answer all of your questions. This project is not restricted to residents only and for it to become a reality; we need as many people as possible to get involved. #### GARDENING FOR WILDLIFE

The extraordinarily warm days that we experienced in February have kick started many species to emerge from hibernation. Amphibians (frogs, toads and newts) are already returning to their breeding ponds and birds are on the lookout for nesting materials and suitable sites. Robins are generally the first birds to build their nests, starting this month so it's best to avoid pruning hedges and trees until the end of the Summer, to avoid disturbing them.

On any warmer days, large queen bumblebees may emerge from their winter hibernation site in the soil and can be seen building up their energy reserves by feeding on nectar and pollen rich flowers. I've seen up to six at a time recently, feasting on the heather in my garden but they will also be drawn to crocuses, lungwort, mahonia and pussy willow. Should you spot a stranded or sleepy looking bumblebee, you might be able to help it by offering a solution of sugar water from a small container or sponge. Once recovered, she will join the others to search for a suitable nest site.

Apparently, bumblebees have smelly feet! This is a useful attribute as it helps other bumblebees to identify a flower that has already been visited, thus avoiding wasting their energy. These fascinating insects, along with all types of bees, play a vital part in pollinating crops and wildflowers so it's important, as Gardeners, to do what we can to support them.

As Spring bulbs, such as: winter aconites, snowdrops, snowflakes, anemones and bluebells, finish flowering, you can increase your stocks by dividing them and planting them 'in the green' in other parts of your garden. This will provide an improved display and more nectar and pollen for insects next Spring. *Pauline Knutton*

#### LOOK AFTER YOURSELF – WELLBEING HINTS AND TIPS

#### If low, hit the power up button

The beginning of March means the Paddock Wood half marathon - one of the biggest in the south of England attracting a huge number of participants of all abilities. It is very well supported and organised by our local Paddock Wood Athletics Club, with cheerful crowds who come out to cheer the finishers, especially through the final mile in the town.

Now at about a mile to go I have seen, on at least two occasions, a young lad holding a large piece of cardboard with a painted red circle and the words "power up button". Runners pass by and tap the cardboard; and they get a power up. Just believing or even just hitting that button and you get a power up. I have felt this. Around 30-35% of the benefit of any medicine is a placebo effect - an effect that is caused by our brain not the chemical in the pill. Even more strange is that there is a placebo effect even among people who, in a trial, know they are not taking some medicine but only a dummy pill. So you can take a dummy pill, with no active ingredients, know it is a dummy pill, and still get an associated positive effect. The brain is, well, a very funny thing.

Now you can't grow a missing limb by believing it into existence, but scientists have learnt to monitor communication happening between the brain and other parts of the body at a cellular level through the chemistry of the body. I was recently running a long race and was quite exhausted. My running mate Steve said - "OK Bob, let's keep the finish nice and steady. No silly sprints." And that did it. Those words unlocked in me a package of energy I thought long gone and I ran off ahead. Without doubt, the brain is a funny thing.

So if things are low for you find yourself a power up button, and press it. Take a sweet and tell yourself "This is my feel better pill." And if you need to, find a spot where you can yell at the world and really get it all out, like Andy Murray does when the match goes wrong. And don't worry if you don't believe any of this will do anything. You don't need to. Your brain is stranger than you know. *Bob Bowie* 

#### JANUARY PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

#### First public open session

**WSRA** - Lengthy discussions took place about the running of the Wateringbury Sports and Recreation Association, which is a registered charity, and the two leases between the Association and the Parish Council, one from 1980 and the other from 2000. It was hoped that by the end of February the Association would be in a position to elect the necessary officers to run the Association for the coming year.

**Plans for Sports Pavilion Extension** two members of the public (one from Switch Charity in

Maidstone) asked the Council to re-activate the initial plans put forward about 5-6 years ago to extend the Sports Pavilion. The Switch representative said the charity worked with young people from 11-21 and there was a great need to have more facilities for young people to 'drop-in'. Councillors were receptive to the idea of costing the plans and looking to see what grants would be available. It was felt that in addition to use for sporting activities an extended pavilion could be used as a village hub for youth and retired members of the community to use.

**Cemetery** Councillors accepted a quote for the removal of spoil from the cemetery. Once the spoil heap has been removed tree work could be carried out.

**Overspill car park for Playing Fields** Councillors agreed that the detailed specialist survey report could be given to companies to obtain quotes for the upgrading of this facility.

#### **Planning Applications**

Councillors had no objections to the following applications:

<u>8 The Orpines</u> Removal of existing conservatory and erection of a single storey side extension and associated external alterations.

<u>Annex at 229 Canon Lane</u> Remove fig tree to allow repair of wall adjacent to Canon Lane which has been damaged by fig tree.

Councillors will leave decisions to Tree Officer in the following:

<u>Annex at 229 Canon Lane</u> Laurel bush – remove as too close to house and damaging paving/brick retaining walls.

Collection of conifers – remove to make safe. Cedar – remove as close to annex. Tree in poor condition and is a risk to buildings. Tree showing excessive die back.

Rose Cottage 210 Canon Lane remove 1 Cypress tree.

#### **Reports from Borough and County Councillors**

**Matt Boughton (T&M)** reported that the Borough Council still needed to find £500,000 in savings to balance the budget. Council tax would be increased by 4.99% which was an increase of £6.93 for a band D property. T & M, along with many other councils, had received refunds on VAT paid some years ago which, on appeal, was found to have been collected in error. T & M's refund was £1.9m

At the second public open forum the need for additional litter bins was identified. Councillor Boughton agreed to action the provision of a larger bin outside the Handy Stores and for the provision of a litter bin at the Bow Road bus stop.

**Sarah Hudson (KCC)** reported that KCC was still struggling to find areas where savings can be made to balance the budget.

#### Traffic matters

**20 mph speed limit near school** Councillors unanimously agreed to fund the cost ( $\pounds$ 7,950) to create a 20mph speed limit in the vicinity of the school

entrances when children were arriving and leaving school. The lights would be operated from the school. **Speedwatch** During January the speedwatch teams carried out 6 one hour sessions. During this time in the hour monitoring downhill traffic in Red Hill 182 vehicles passed and 16 were breaking the speed limit. In Red Hill in the hour 131 vehicles travelled up hill of which 9 were speeding. The remaining sessions were on the A26 observing at Lodge Close. Travelling west 1744 vehicles were observed of which 83 were speeding. Travelling east 1769 vehicles were observed of which 72 were speeding. All offenders were recorded on the Kent Police Speed Watch website. During January the police speedwatch van made two visits and was located in the church layby.

#### **Village Maintenance**

**Trees** – following the survey of trees on parish owned land it was agreed to obtain quotes for the necessary work on those identified as high and medium risk. **Village Hall Wall** - the cost of repairs would be paid by the vehicle's insurers and it was agreed to accept a quote and proceed with the work.

#### I can't get no satisfaction.

Our Lent course which I spoke about in the February edition of Rostrum is going well. We have three sessions left. The first is called, Living with the unexplained and it's an exploration of the subject of suffering. The next is *Living with* what we've been given and it's about facing the hard facts of our existence and the peace that comes with accepting God's will for us. The last session is called Living with absence and its focus is on how the disappointments we experience can lead us to question the presence and love of God. I admit these are not subjects that everyone would find interesting but I think you'd admit the middle one, 'Living with what we've been given', deals with an issue that is perennial and highly topical: dissatisfaction. How we look, how we feel, the relationships we're in, the job we're stuck with, the regrets and failures we live with, to list but a few, are things that many people face. And you may have picked up that society is increasingly at a loss to know how to respond to the ever-growing number of rights that individual people are claiming they have and that must be recognised by everyone else. Whilst passing no judgement on the legitimacy and justification of such claims I nonetheless would suggest that dissatisfaction lies at the root of it all. A great hero of mine, the Victorian author and Christian teacher George MacDonald wrote:

'I presume there is scarce a human being who, resolved to speak openly, would not confess to having something that plagued him, something from which he would gladly be free, something rendering it impossible for him, at the moment, to regard life as an altogether good thing. Most men, I presume, imagine that, free from such and such things antagonistic, life would be an unmingled satisfaction, worthy of being prolonged indefinitely.'
