RIP Peter Richard Cayzer 19 July 1947 – 13 January 2023

Peter was born in Braintree, Essex and his early years were spent on the family farm. However the catastrophic floods of 1953 polluted the land so the farm was no longer viable. The family moved to Ramsgate and in the late 1950s came to Wateringbury having purchased Station Garage and petrol pumps at the top of Bow Road. In the early years the family lived in the flat above the car showroom. Peter was mechanically minded and sometimes skipped school to help his father. He spent the majority of his working life in the family garage where his ability with engines helped to grow the business. Upon the sale of the Station Garage Peter joined Maidstone Mazda. In 1969 Peter met Hilary Waters (whose father owned the Handy Stores) and they were married in June

1971. Peter's interests in life were his family, motors, boats and DIY. His love of boating led him to join Medway Cruising Club and he became its Rear Commodore. In retirement he was diagnosed with Parkinsons then in May 2017 re-diagnosed with PSP. He and Hilary faced its challenges with great courage and fortitude. Peter will be remembered for his strong work ethic, kindness, thoughtfulness and practical jokes. Rostrum sends its condolences to Hilary, Simon, Alison and their families.

ROSTRUM'S VILLAGE AMENITIES FUND

Rostrum makes grants to individuals and organisations which will help enhance the amenities of the village. Last year, 2022, it contributed £972 in four grants, including two small grants to Wateringbury Local History Society and the Church's Flower Festival. Obviously to do so depends on the continuing support of its advertisers, Rostrum's sole source of income. Our readers' support of our advertisers is appreciated.

The fund made a grant to the owner of the Mill Pond to enable her to erect a sign by the pond about the wildlife seen on the pond. The sign was made by a family run, Yalding based, firm, JB Signs Ltd, who deal with site, vehicle and shop front signage. It was put up by Wateringbury resident, Steve, a family member. The owner of the pond is to be congratulated on her stewardship since she acquired the pond from a non-resident owner some years ago. A photo of the sign and pond is on the front cover of this edition.

A grant was also made to Wateringbury School to help finance their new web-site. The old site was user unfriendly. The new website, amongst other improvements, helps you make a virtual tour of the school.

The fund is open for applications to contribute to specific projects which benefit the village. These could be in the areas of education, youth or senior services, heritage, worship, environment and sport, but others will be considered. It is unlikely that any individual grant would exceed £750. Applications should be made in writing to rostrum2@hotmail.com describing the project in no more than 250 words; on the basis of this initial proposal further specific information may be requested. **Proposals should be received by 31** March for decision shortly afterwards. APPEAL FOR UKRAINE AND TURKEY:

Unfortunately the need for donations to be sent to **Ukraine** continues and we now hope to help Turkey since the devastating earthquakes. For Ukraine: needed right now - girls & boys (age 3-17) items - key rings, fidget toys, pencils, individually wrapped sweets, biscuits, lollipops, cereals, toiletries etc. These items will be put in shoeboxes for children still living in Ukraine. Baby items, sanitary items etc are still essential needs. Also desperately needed are items for the animals in Ukraine: animal feed and medication; any unused dog, cat, small animal medication or if your

pet no longer likes the food provided, please donate. Bandages, pain relief, flea & worm treatments, medication for stress, pet carriers, baskets, bedding, pet cages, etc.

For Turkey: Urgently needed are new clothes, nearly new shoes, boots etc. Blankets, animal & human dried & canned food, nappies, wipes, bottles, dummies etc. - all must be new. The reason items should be new is that although this is a terrible disaster it is not ongoing & will be resolved unlike the war in Ukraine. Only a limited number of lorries are going so need to be filled with good quality items.

A REMINDER FROM KCC AND T & M COUNCILLOR SARAH HUDSON

From May 2023 individuals who wish to vote in person, including those acting as a proxy on behalf of another individual, will be required to produce an accepted form of photographic ID to vote.

The following documents, including expired versions, will be accepted as long as the photo is a good enough likeness:

- A passport issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, a European Economic Area (EEA) state or a Commonwealth country
- Photographic driver's licence (full or provisional) issued by the UK, Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, or an EEA state
- EEA photographic ID card
- UK Biometric Residence Permit
- An identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (PASS card)
- A blue badge
- Oyster 60+ card
- A concessionary travel pass funded by HM Government or local authority, such as KCC.

A GIFT OFFERING SKILLS FOR LIFE

Almost without exception, people who own and run a car think that they are a 'good driver'. And then we get out there on the road and notice all the 'bad drivers' around. Since 1956 there has been an organisation that offers the opportunity for all drivers to improve their driving to an 'Advanced' standard. Nowadays it is known as **IAM RoadSmart**. They offer driver training and assessments throughout the country based around IPSGA – the System of Car Control.

IAM RoadSmart operates mainly through local charity groups of volunteers, all of whom have taken their own advanced test as well as additional training and a qualification as an 'Observer' to deliver that training to others. Observers may also carry out basic driving assessments for members of the public. Drivers may enrol in an 'Advanced Driver' course to go on to take the advanced test. There are also 'Advanced Rider' courses run through similar local motorcycle groups. And there is a no-test 'Young Driver Assessment' available too.

In 2022 the IAM RoadSmart test may be 'passed' or the candidate may achieve a higher standard named 'F1rst'. Having passed the test, one becomes a member of IAM RoadSmart. There is then an option to go on to train for and acquire a 'Masters' standard and this may also be simply 'passed' or achieved with 'Distinction'. The latter is the highest level of driving that is available to the civilian population.

Anyway, wherever you are in your driving lifetime there is something for you. The local group is Kent Group Advanced Motorists (KGAM) formed in 1978. They run courses at two Kent centres which run on Sunday mornings: the western one is at Grove Green to the north east of Maidstone. For those who have other commitments on Sunday mornings there is an alternative course offering too. might benefit for improving their driving then why not buy them a 'train and test' package for Christmas or a Birthday?

WATERINGBURY'S TWO WAR MEMORIALS

Wateringbury has two WWI memorials. The village memorial in the Chapel of St George in the church, and the old school memorial which now hangs in the church vestry. The school memorial has five tall panels, the centre of which is the Roll of Honour for pupils who gave their lives, whilst the two tall panels either side names pupils who served in the war but returned home.

To commemorate the centenary of the start of WWI in 1914, I compiled two A5 booklets for Wateringbury church, with a short military and family biography of each man who is commemorated on one or both of Wateringbury's war memorials.

For the 2018 celebrations to mark the end of WWI, I compiled a book which not only included men who gave their lives, but also all the 213 men who served in the war but returned home.

Unfortunately, there is far less available information for returning servicemen than for those who gave their lives, and though I have short personal details and the force in which they served for the majority of those who came home, I haven't completed my project for all men, as information just isn't available. FEBRUARY PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

As the chairman was unwell the meeting was chaired by Michael Wells, vice chairman.

Borough and KCC – Sarah Hudson reported that, since no additional Central Government support was available, difficult decisions to balance the budgets of both Tonbridge & Malling Borough Council and Kent County Council will have to be made at meetings to be held later in the month.

Sarah had applied to the National Lottery for funding to help the village celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III. Later in the month Sarah has called a public meeting to discuss possible ways to mark the occasion.

KCC have made available 300 sapling trees and Sarah suggested that the lower play area at the Playing Fields which is being decommissioned would be a suitable place to plant the saplings to create a small wooded area.

Cemetery – the necessary legal procedures have now been completed to finalise the purchase of the cemetery car park which is now owned by the Parish.

Christmas decorations - the Clerk was asked to contact KCC to investigate the steps needed to gain permission for Christmas Lights to be fixed to some lamp posts.

Crime – no crimes were shown on the police web-site for the past month. The CCTV at the Playing Fields which was vandalised has now been repaired and is fully operational.

Policy document updates – Standing Orders and Finance Regulations– these procedures, with one amendment on each, were approved. The Council's Communications procedures will be revised by the clerk and discussed at the March meeting.

Village Maintenance – Following discussions on the quotes obtained to cut the grass at the Playing Fields, Cemetery, etc in the village. It was decided to appoint Three Counties Contracting. The sports clubs would like the cut grass to be collected rather than left on the ground and this was agreed and will be part of the new contract.

Trees The Clerk was asked to arrange for the necessary professionals to inspect the condition of all trees on Council owned

land and to report the findings back with suggested actions needed.

Grant Applications for new play equipment - Councillor Fielding was delighted to announce that a £8,700 grant had been received from the National Lottery Community Fund to help with the cost of new play equipment. A larger grant application has also been made to FCC Community Fund and the outcome will be known in March. The Council wish to provide play equipment for younger children and also to have more all ability equipment to widen access and enjoyment possibilities so that all children can enjoy a good play experience.

Extension of Green Belt to protect the green wedges between Kings Hill and adjoining villages. Councillors agreed to support steps being taken by various bodies to achieve this extension.

Planning Applications - The following applications were considered:

<u>8 Upper Mill</u> – Front extensions, conversion of garage, internal alterations and remodelling works. *No objections if neighbours concerns are addressed*

The White Cottage, 171 Tonbridge Road – No objections provided Listed Building Officer's concerns are taken into account Claremont House, 200 Tonbridge Road – Conversion of loft space into one residential unit, including alterations to the roof, inclusion of 5 skylights, one velux window and 7 arched dormer windows Councillors object to this application and support all neighbour concerns

90 Bow Road – Single storey side and rear extension *No objections*

Public Discussion The chairman welcomed Matt Boughton leader of T & M Borough Council who had come along to the meeting as a member of the public. He spoke of his hope that central government will pass the law, currently at the consultation stage, which will mean that Borough Councils can challenge the new house building targets set by Central Government and which local councils are at present required to meet. T & M consider that its present targets are excessive and would welcome the chance to appeal them.

A resident drew Council's attention to car parking at Fields Lane at weekends which he considered to be hazardous.

The next meeting of the Council will be in the village hall upper room on Tuesday 7th March at 7.30pm. Members of the public are very welcome. Approved minutes of council meetings will appear on the Parish Council website www.wateringbury pc.org.uk in due course

WATERINGBURY PARISH COUNCIL'S FINANCES AND PRECEPT 2023-24

Parish councils are generally the most un-bureaucratic and cost-effective kind of local authority. They raise most of the income from a precept, a tax that is collected on its behalf by Tonbridge & Malling Borough Council. Wateringbury currently has 2,249 residents according to the 2021 census.

The parish council decides annually what the precept should be. It does this by setting a budget that forecasts the expected expenditure and income for the year (April to March). Councillors then decide what the precept needs to be, to cover anticipated expenditure considering inflation and other factors. This coming year there is a need to increase the precept to cover these increases, some of which have been caused by global events. Our electricity charges and other utility services will increase along with insurance, maintaining the fields, play equipment and repairs such as CCTV damage.

The Parish council will continue to ensure that it always gets value for money and is held accountable and monitored in many ways, including internal and external audits. Our aim is to provide the best possible service at the best price, while continuing to implement village improvements. Cllr Patrick Gregson (Chairman)

Little Pennies and New Beginnings.

The children played games in the church for which they collected points. At the end the points were added up and there were prizes for the winners. We had some party food and the big penny count-up to see how much each child had collected. The amounts were entered onto a certificate and each child was given their own printed and signed certificate stating how much they had raised for *The Children's Society*. There was a lovely atmosphere and everyone who came along enjoyed it very much. I look forward to doing this again this Christmas and New Year. The total amount collected at the *Penny Party* was £66.33 and with the £121.25 collected at the Christingle Service in West Peckham the total we were able to send to *The Children's Society* was £187.58.

This little event together with the Christingle Services that preceded it was made possible by the generosity of people in the churches who gave money for the materials, others who helped run the events and Little Waitrose on Kings Hill which donated all the oranges. A nice little sum of money was raised and a lot of fun for children and adults was had along the way. It was a new venture and like the pennies collected it's a small thing really. But I hope it can grow and that this will become a main event in our Churches' calendar.

LOOK AFTER YOURSELF – WELLBEING HINTS AND TIPS Don't just do something. Sit there and notice...

A common problem is when we develop circular thoughts that spin endlessly, repeating the same sequence in your head. It could be a problem you have to solve, or a negative experience you had which you can't shake out. This sort of circular thinking can take up a huge amount of our headspace and it stops us noticing what is around us right now. We start to live inside the problems of the past or the future.

This is an exercise that is intended to help you focus and attend to something here and now.

- 1. Get a small pebble, no bigger than your finger nail, or a raisin
- 2. Hold it in the centre of your hand and feel its slight weight.
- 3. Notice whether it feels cool or warm.
- 4. Notice its colour, its texture.
- 5. Trace your finger around its surface edges noticing whether they are rough or smooth.
- 6. Gently role it around the palm of your hand so you can feel every side of it.

Repeat this once or twice over. The rule is to stay focussed on all of the elements of the small object you have chosen. You

could get a few small objects and go through them one at a time. By focussing on a physical object with form, shape and size, you are trying to get your brain to disengage with circular thinking and focus on the object.
