We wish to inform you that due to the Coronavirus outbreak the forthcoming Wateringbury **Village Fete** on Sunday 7 June 2020 has been **CANCELLED**.

Thank you to all those who were willing to support the event and we hope for a more positive outcome next year.

### **MESSAGE FROM WATERINGBURY SURGERY- Coronavirus (COVID-19) Surgery Planning:**

This is important information, so please read and, if you can, share with family and friends who are patients of the surgery. Wateringbury Surgery wants to keep our patients and staff as safe as possible during this difficult time. Many GP surgeries have had to be shut down completely in recent weeks and we are trying to prevent this happening. To this end please note the following temporary changes to our services with immediate effect:

- 1) All online appointment booking will be suspended.
- 2) All GP appointment requests will be triaged by a GP. The receptionist will take your details and a GP will call you back (please ensure you remain near the telephone or have your mobile with you at all times). If the GP feels it is appropriate for you to be seen they will book you an appointment at the surgery. The receptionist cannot book any appointments with the GPs.

- 3) We will continue to book appointments with the Practice Nurses, HCAs and Phlebotomist, however, on the day of your appointment do not attend if you have a new continuous cough or a high temperature (hot to touch on your chest or back). Please telephone and cancel.
- 4) We will be sending screening text messages prior to appointments to ensure patients are well before attending.
- 5) Automatic Check-in screens at reception will be turned off and any patient arriving at the surgery will need to read the screening questions on the display board at Watringbury and inner entrance door at Larkfield. If the answer is yes please return home immediately and call the surgery.
- 6) If you need to request medication and you usually drop your request into the surgery please post your prescription through the letter box and do not come into the surgery. We are looking to provide a delivery service for patients over 70 and those in a vulnerable group who are self- isolating.

Please help us to keep our community safe. We are trying to minimise the number of patients coming to the surgery to protect them and our staff. If your medical issue is not urgent and is something that you feel can wait, then we would suggest delaying booking appointments over the next few weeks/months.

If you're not sure if your symptoms require urgent advice then you can use the symptom checker on the NHS app which can be downloaded here <https://www.nhs.uk/apps-library/nhs-app/> or online at <https://111.nhs.uk/>. Please be patient and kind to our reception staff during this time. They are doing their best under enormous unprecedented pressure. The latest position regarding self-isolation is: You should stay at home for 7 days if you have either: a high temperature – feel hot to touch on chest or back a new, continuous cough – this means you've started coughing repeatedly Other people in the household should stay at home for 14 days from the day that you got symptoms.

You should use the NHS 111 online coronavirus service <https://111.nhs.uk/covid-19/> if: you feel you cannot cope with your symptoms at home your condition gets worse your symptoms do not get better after 7 days

## **WATERINGBURY CE PRIMARY SCHOOL AN APPEAL FOR HELP**

At the time of writing, our country and our community is facing the unprecedented challenge of the coronavirus outbreak. While school has been continuing (at the time of going to press), some activities in and out of school have already been affected. Whatever happens, we will do our utmost to ensure that teaching and learning continues in some form over the coming weeks and months and preparations are well in hand to enable this to happen. We are extremely grateful for all the support we've received to date and remain appreciative of everyone's help and support throughout the challenging times ahead.

Against this concerning backdrop, we have to try and maintain a focus on our key goals for this year and we are seeking wider community support to help us achieve one of these priority goals.

We have launched an important and exciting campaign which will benefit every child in our school from September. Our school needs to raise £25,000 as quickly as possible to expand the classroom sizes for our oldest pupils in Years 5 and 6 to give them 'space to learn and room to grow.' The ageing classrooms are now 37% below the Department for Education's current recommended classroom sizes. By rearranging internal walls and expanding them into an adjoining spare room, we can make the cramped classrooms around 40% larger. This will provide a significantly improved teaching and learning environment and will particularly benefit children with higher needs.

In the current climate, this campaign faces an uphill struggle. However, whenever we have reached out to our local community for help, you have always delivered generously and wholeheartedly. Our target is achievable with your support and it will make a massive difference to our children and our school.

### **REPORT FROM SARAH HUDSON, BOROUGH COUNCILLOR**

**The living wall panels** have been fitted to the walls outside the village hall. The panels under the trees are watered by an irrigation system, with water supplied, and paid for, by the village hall. Incredible thanks go to local gardener Robert Millar for his many hours of work, getting the ground ready for the plants, and providing us with a source for the plants that we needed. Huge thanks also go to The Friends of Wateringbury who met in mid-March, and planted the areas with plants, specifically chosen for their ability to absorb nitrogen dioxide and other particulates. TMBC have agreed to continue assessing the air quality with the monitoring equipment at the village hall, so we can really see what difference these plants make to the air quality. And it will have the added benefit of improving the amenity area around the crossroads with some lovely plants that will brighten up the centre of the village.

### **Wateringbury Community Fridge**

Another initiative in combating food waste is the Wateringbury Community Fridge and Cafe which has just started. This is open

on Tuesday mornings between 10am and 1pm, at the village hall. Community Fridges redistribute good food to communities, allowing them to access nutritious food, whilst saving money and reducing waste. The motto is 'Take what you need, pay what you can'. Anyone can come along - just bring a bag for life, so you can fill it up with fresh fruit and veg, meat and all sorts of food cupboard staples. We ask for a minimum donation of £5.

### **Community Day**

Our 'Make Wateringbury Better' Community day is being held on Friday 8th May from 9.30am to 12.30pm at the Village Hall. Free refreshments for everyone - lots of cakes and biscuits, as well as tea and coffee, so please come along and meet me, and other village bodies such as the Parish Council and the Friends of Wateringbury, and tell us what we can do to improve the community and make Wateringbury better! ## **MARCH PARISH COUNCIL NOTES**

**KCC Councillor Matthew Balfour** reported that the matter of speed indicators for the village were still under discussion. Following the heavy rainfalls over recent weeks Kent's roads were in a poor condition. It was not possible for repairs to be carried out successfully in wet weather. They will be done as soon as conditions allow. The coronavirus pandemic was a cause for concern and Kent was working closely with central government to prevent its spread. For up to date guidance use the KCC and Government websites.

**Borough Councillor Sarah Hudson** sent her apologies as she was at a T & M meeting. She submitted a written report which was read by the chairman. The Living wall at the cross roads will be installed and planted soon. It will be officially opened on Friday 8<sup>th</sup> May by Nicolas Heslop as part of the Community Event Sarah is organising on that morning in the village hall with the theme Making Wateringbury Better. The Wateringbury Community Fridge will open shortly on Tuesday mornings in the village hall. It is not a food bank and is open to everyone with the motto 'Take what you need Pay what you can'. One bag allowance per person.

**Bus Shelters.** Both bus shelters have been inspected and found to be in need of roof repairs. Some of the damage to the Bow Road shelter had reportedly been caused by nearby trees. Councillors agreed to contact the Housing Association which is responsible for the surrounding foliage informing them of the need for heavy pruning or removal to be done before the repairs were carried out. The cost of the repairs to both shelters will be £2,500

**Playing Fields.** The Womens' Institute celebrate their centenary this year and to mark the event hope to plant an oak tree at the Playing Fields. The Council were happy to grant permission subject to the approval of the Fields Association. Repairs to the track down to the fields have been completed. Following a risk assessment the four seats on the play equipment scales were shown to be damaged. Councillors agreed to their replacement at a cost of £982.

**Speed Survey Boxes** which the council has organised are now in place and it is hoped the findings will strengthen efforts to improve traffic flow in the village. The Speedwatch teams had been out in the village for 13 one hour sessions during February and 2,995 vehicles passed by with 302 observations of speeding.

**Village Flower Festival to mark 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of end of WW2** Councillors agreed to a request to sponsor a flower

arrangement at the Flowers for Peace event at the Church on 23<sup>rd</sup>, 24<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> May. (Since the meeting the festival has been postponed until 2021).

### **Planning applications**

Replacement of existing cladding with new timber cladding, replacement of windows and new front boundary treatment  
Lower Beck, 18 Mill Lane, Wateringbury  
No objection. The contractor should consider the impact of using Mill Lane based on the experience of residents on previous occasions.
