MARCH PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The meeting opened with the Chairman extending a warm welcome to a new member of the Parish Council, **Keith Fisher**, who has lived in Wateringbury for many years. The welcome return of **David Marks** to the Parish Council was also announced.

Richard Tripp congratulated Cllr Chris Talbert on his recent marriage to Janet Hall.

New 40mph advisory signs have been erected approaching the bend of the A26 Tonbridge Road near to the junction of Pizien Well. Unfortunately, one sign has already been damaged. Comments from residents would be welcomed as it is felt that further improvements are needed to encourage motorists to reduce their travelling speed on this bend.

Crimes reported during December in the village amounted to eight: 2 violent crimes, 2 anti-social behaviour, 3 criminal damage and 1 vehicle crime.

Drayhorse Meadow - trees abutting the building require trimming and this will then allow access for repairs to be carried out to the roof. The stables have been cleaned and painted and are in good order. Councillors should be present when the stables are handed over to the new tenant.

The issue of Parish Councillors attending **planning consent site meetings** was discussed. Councillors felt that often their knowledge of the local area could be beneficial on these occasions but the current rules restrict them from offering their comments. Procedures at the present time only allow them to report to Parish Council meetings and then comment on applications. The matter is to be taken up with T&MBC.

During February the **Speed Watch** team made 529 observations of vehicles speeding through the village and this total will have been added to the Kent Police Community Speed Watch database.

Arriva Bus Service 6 - Maidstone to Tunbridge Wells via Wateringbury, East Peckham and Paddock Wood. completely revised from 2 April 2017. Service 6 will run only between Tunbridge Wells and East Peckham, with some school-time buses to and from Maidstone. Five Oak Green will no longer be served. Daytime frequency every thirty minutes. New Sunday service. New Service 66 will link East Peckham with Maidstone Hospital. See more at: https://www.arrivabus.co.uk/

During the public session a local resident volunteered his services to clean the village signs. Unfortunately, due to insurance cover restrictions this offer is unable to be accepted at the present time. In view of future budget cutbacks. The clerk is to investigate extending insurance cover for volunteer activities which enhance village life.

Other items raised during the public session were:

Overgrown vegetation encroaching on the pavement of Bow Road between Leney Road and Phoenix Drive. It is proving hazardous to pedestrians and is a well-used school route. It also restricts the view to drivers turning right out of Phoenix Drive. The problem of litter deposited around the village. Overgrown shrubs on the Tonbridge Road are making it difficult for pedestrians. (All residents are requested to cut back vegetation from their property boundaries to keep pavements clear)

A resident of the village accompanied the Chairman to inspect various matters that need addressing along Bow Road.

The "Welcome to Wateringbury" sign near the school has been missing for about 7 months. (The finger signpost at the crossroads is also being repaired by the same company - the clerk will contact them)

The Park Road sign in Pizien Well is missing.

The condition of the **zebra crossing near the school** is poor and road markings are faded. The village school will be asking for support for a possible pelican crossing.

Residents in Old Road who use the post box in the wall opposite the entrance to Old Road find crossing the A26 precarious. Would it be possible to have another post box?

Planning Subject to any comments/objections from neighbours the Parish Council had no objections to the following applications:

2 Old Road - TM/17/00473/FL - First floor front/side extension, demolition of conservatory and erection of a garden room, alterations to elevations including rendering brickwork. No objections.

8 Warden Mill Close - TM/17/00479/FL - Single storey rear addition and construction of porch. No objections.

WAR NEWS APRIL 1917

April 6: United States declares war on Germany.

April 9: Allied Artois and Champagne offensive starts (Battle of Vimy Ridge).

April 16: French Nivelle Offensive starts.

The village had no war deaths in April. The news of the United States entry into the war on 6th April, following Germany's adoption of unrestricted submarine warfare, was received across the nation with relief and, possibly, a feeling of "about time too". In Wateringbury the senior classes of both the boys and girls schools attended a service at the Church on 20th April. The Boys' school log says the service was "to celebrate the entry of America into the war" and the Girls' school log says "in recognition of America joining the Allies to fight against barbarism."

With so many men in the armed forces, inflationary pressures on wages and salaries started and in Wateringbury we see the evidence of this with the Parish Clerk applying to the Council for an increase. The council deferred a decision but a few months later agreed to pay the Assistant Overseer a "war bonus" of £10, to be paid in two instalments. The school cleaner, Mrs Weller, had been given an additional 1s. a week for the duration of the war in the previous year.

The Board of Frederick Leney met regularly (in the village) and the minutes now record more commercial matters than previously. Although profitability is not mentioned, it is evident that the firm had not suffered financially from the government's attack on alcohol (shorter pub hours; weaker beer; higher duty etc.). A series of substantial (£23,000 by the end of 1917- equivalent to over £1 million today) investments start in Government War Bonds. Its direct taxes though, for 1916 of £31, seem modest. Discussions with other brewers had taken place to ensure that a new beer price to tenants and for retail were adopted. These were announced on 4^{th} April as 5d. (2 pence) for a pint of mild, and 8d (3 pence) for a pint of ale or stout. Starting in May, distribution would be by motor to pubs in the Sittingbourne and Chatham areas, enabling a man, horse and dray to be dispensed with.

Throughout the country there was great fear of attack on civilians from the air by Zeppelin or aircraft. In Wateringbury this is reflected in the church accounts for the year ended 31st March 1917 which include an insurance premium of over £7 for "aircraft" insurance, the largest individual premium for that year. Bombing from Zeppelins had started in 1915; aircraft bombing started in June 1917 when 162 people were killed in London (including 18 school children at a Poplar primary school). The Leney Board did not get round to discussing the matter of aircraft insurance until September 1917 when it decided to insure against "air raid" on its pubs in the Chatham area This is surprising given that the related Leney company in Dover had been bombed several times. Wateringbury did not actually suffer from the air in WW1, but it is an ongoing theme to which we will return. Terry Bird

WATERINGBURY CE PRIMARY SCHOOL

As we march into spring and the days grow warmer, school life naturally turns to the outdoors. We welcomed eight students from Oakwood Grammar School on their Community Volunteer Day. The boys cleared our pond and nature areas of the winter debris (and many lost balls!). They worked enthusiastically and industriously and were a real credit to their school. During the afternoon, the boys read with our young readers and were excellent role models as they shared their enjoyment of books. Our own Gardening Club and Year 2 Gardening School have been busy planting 50 saplings in our 'orchard' at the bottom of the school field; the children's interest in digging and planting is wonderful to see. A group of eight Year 5 pupils participated in a 6-week Forest School project, led by a parent trainee instructor, in a beautiful patch of woodland at Nettlestead Place. We are fortunate, indeed, to be able to offer these experiences to our children and we're very grateful for the support of our community and neighbours. And to top it all off, we were awarded a £600 grant by Caterlink for our bid to create a kitchen garden. Plans include a raised bed for each class, composters, a water butt and fruit trees!

We've enjoyed two themed weeks this term with Book Week and Science Week both taking place in March. Our English team chose the stunning children's book The Lost Thing by Shaun Tan and each class drew on different themes in the story to produce written work and artwork. Our library was transformed into a 'lost thing' scrapyard for the children to build their own lost things to inspire their writing. Science Week concluded with our annual Science Fair which is now a highlight of the year. Our young scientists were able to explain their investigations and scientific knowledge to parent visitors throughout the final afternoon and loved taking on the role and expertise of scientists!

Year 5 will be performing their version of A Midsummer Night's Dream as part of their work in English; the children have enjoyed a trip to the Globe theatre and a series of drama workshops in preparation for their performance. They have written the script themselves, drawing on their deep understanding of the play and its language.

Our term closes with **our Easter Service at 9:00 at St John's on 31st March**, followed by an afternoon of Easter activities and our annual Easter egg hunt which is organised by our parent volunteer organisation, FOWPS.

The **new term starts Tuesday**, **18**th **April** and it's always a busy term with final preparations for the Year 6 SATs week. Our annual St George's Day assembly will take place at the flagpole two days early on 21st April which coincides fortuitously this year with the birthday of Queen Elizabeth II. We will also be hosting our annual open air service with St John's on Rogation Sunday on 21st May at 10:00, followed by games and a picnic. We wish you all a happy and peaceful Easter.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ

My comments in this issue of your parish magazine are broadly the same as those in the 'Beneficial News' which I know many of you read, this is for one straightforward reason. The main subject I'm going to talk about needs to come to the attention not only of active members of our worshipping community in Wateringbury, Teston and East Malling but also the readers of the various parish magazines who may not attend any of our churches, but who like to know what's going on and like to offer their views on those events.

As you may be aware we have been carrying out a consultation on a new service pattern for some time now. This consultation is now closed but I would like to thank those of you who made constructive comments as to how this might be achieved, they have been read with interest by all those involved in the process. The new service pattern comes into use on Sunday 7 May 2017. It is by no means perfect, but it is the best of a job that is in reality much more difficult than it appears on the surface. For most people who worship at Wateringbury and East Malling there are some slight changes, there are however no changes at Teston. You will be able to find copies of the full service pattern on your Church notice boards but as I said there aren't too many changes to get used to.

The new pattern allows me as Vicar of all three Churches to regularly and predictably be with you for services in the course of the month, something I am looking forward to, in addition if we are lucky enough to gain any additional 'staff' clergy (which is unlikely) then it will become possible for me to attend even more services across the benefice.

On Sunday 7 May the days services across all three churches look like this:

8.30am - Holy Communion (BCP said) - East Malling

9.45am - Non Eucharistic family service - East Malling

9.45am - Children's Church - Teston

10.00am - Holy Communion (Common Worship sung) - Wateringbury

For other weeks please see the church notice boards.

Special services, like Christmas and Easter are not included this pattern as I will endeavour to arrange additional clergy cover so if necessary a Eucharist can be held in all three Churches but we'll deal with those things as they arrive.

Easter is traditionally a time of rebirth and renewal and Pentecost a time when we particularly look to the action of the Holy Spirit in our lives. I hope and pray that this new service pattern will herald a time of spiritual rebirth and reinvigoration for all of us.
