Items for animals needed urgently too – cat and dog food, dog coats, flea treatments, collars, leads, blankets etc.

Men's clothing and boots for the Ukraine soldiers.

Shoe boxes are made up for children so any small items - pencils, soft toys, balls, cars, figures, balloons, hair accessories and products, soaps etc.

Household items - kitchen utensils as well as bedding and towels. Articulated lorries regularly travel to Ukraine so

### NEWS FROM BOROUGH & KCC COUNCILLOR SARAH HUDSON

The Boundary Commission for England published new revised proposals for constituencies across the country and opens a final month-long consultation, giving the public a last opportunity to send in their views. The Commission has taken into consideration over 45,000 comments sent in by the public during the previous two stages of public consultation, and has changed nearly half of its initial proposals based on this feedback. A third and final consultation on the new map of revised constituency proposals is open now until 5 December. The public are invited to view and comment on the new map at www.bcereviews.org.uk.

The Commission is undertaking an independent review of all constituencies in England as requested by Parliament. The number of electors within each constituency currently varies widely due to population changes since the last boundary review. The 2023 Boundary Review will rebalance the number of electors each MP represents, resulting in significant change to the existing constituency map. As part of the review, the number of constituencies in England will increase from 533 to 543. After this final consultation has closed on 5 December, the Commission will analyse the responses and form its final recommendations. These will be submitted to Parliament by 1 July 2023.

The reason for asking you to comment is that it is suggested that Wateringbury be moved into Maidstone & Malling Constituency, and removed from Tonbridge & Malling Consitutency. So we would have a new MP at the next election. What are your thoughts? Nettlestead is also moving, so would not be in the same constituency still. Please take the opportunity to voice your thoughts, although the window is short.

### GARDENING FOR WILDLIFE

Our weather seems to be veering from one extreme to the other at present and this is resulting in some bizarre results. Geraniums are still flowering and looking better than they did in the Summer, whilst snowdrops have been seen flowering near the millpond! Our wildlife is equally confused but we must expect a cold snap at some point and there are things we can do to assist them in preparation.

Now is a good time to clean out bird-boxes that may be used for roosting by birds for protection in the Winter months and then, hopefully, they will return in the Spring to build their nests.

Putting food out for the birds now will help them to identify where it can be regularly found when the weather turns colder and may encourage different species to those we usually see. I particularly enjoy watching the parties of long tailed tits that descend onto my feeders when food is scarce elsewhere and then roost huddled together for warmth in nearby trees.

Other species may just join us for the Winter; these may include; snipe, woodcock, siskins and redpolls or even the rare and very beautiful, tiny firecrest. I've only ever seen one! Apparently, even some of the blackbirds that seem common in our gardens may actually have travelled here from Norway to spend a warmer Winter!

If you have a pond, it's worth putting a net over it to stop leaves blowing in and then decaying, which can reduce oxygen levels. Small amounts of leaves can be added to compost bins, whereas larger amounts are better mowed up and then stored in plastic sacks or other containers where they'll turn into leaf-mould to be used sometime next year as a mulch.

### NOVEMBER PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

**New CCTV Cameras at Playing Fields** have been installed and give good quality images covering the Sports Pavilion and all the fields. More signs will be placed at the fields warning of the CCTV operations.

KCC and T&M Councillor Sarah Hudson reported on local matters including:

<u>Traffic calming measures on A26</u> - a few snagging items were outstanding including the 40 signs on the road and 40 road signs.

<u>Bollards</u> had been put in place to stop parking on KCC amenity land.

<u>Telecommunication Mast at the Cross Roads</u> - the necessary planning permission to paint the mast has now been received. <u>Local Plan consultations</u> - a well attended meeting had been held in the village hall to outline the process. 291 possible development sites had been received in the Borough. About 80% of these will be rejected as they do not meet the necessary criteria. The remaining 20% will be studied in detail and the final outcome of the consultations is expected next summer.

<u>Village Christmas Tree</u> – a large tree will be in place at the junction of Bow Road and A26 and **the lights will be switched on at 4pm on 11<sup>th</sup> December.** Sarah hopes residents will come and sing some carols. **Play equipment at Playing Fields** - councillors agreed to accept quotes from Playdale and Safeplay for the repair of various items of equipment. An official resolution was passed to allow councillor Francis Fielding to act on its behalf and sign grant application forms. The Parish Council also needs to demonstrate that residents agree there is a need for new play equipment. An app will be set up to allow for an on-line survey to be completed.

**Traffic matters -** Speeding in the village envelope is still a major cause for concern. The police have attended several times with their speed safety camera van to monitor traffic speeds in the village and the Speed Watch team will continue with their monitoring sessions.

**Planning** Councillors had no objections to replacement of existing white softwood single glazed windows with new white softwood double glazed windows at <u>Watermill</u> <u>Cottage, 7 Love Lane.</u> –The application at <u>Millmeadow House,</u> <u>22 Mill Lane</u> – erection of 14 solar modules - they left the decision to the Conservation Officer.

**Retirement of Clerk** Sue's final meeting will be on 15<sup>th</sup> November at the Finance meeting to discuss 2023/24's budget. However at the end of the general meeting several residents thanked her for all she has done for the village over the last 25 years.

**Next Meetings** to which members of the public are very welcome are **Tuesdays 6<sup>th</sup> December and 10<sup>th</sup> January** (note 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday) in the upper room of the village hall at 7.30pm.

## Copy of the Council's response to T&M Local Plan Consultation Regulation 18 Local Plan – Consultation

Wateringbury Parish Council objects to the development of all sites proposed in the local plan.

The objections should prevent all sites being considered as they all adversely impact most or all of the following:

- Degradation of the Green Belt and Green Wedges that surround the village. Breaching, removing or altering would result in the village merging with surrounding villages/local authority and remove and disrupt the identity of Wateringbury as a Village.
- The previous local plan stipulated that **no further development would occur in or around Wateringbury until 2030** due to the significant impacts on **air quality and pollution**. Subsequent investigations and reports now emphasise the impacts on human health even more so and we request the local plan continues to stipulate no development for a period of ten years or until such time that pollution is brought under control by effective traffic management.
- The traffic through Wateringbury cross roads is already over capacity (at 24% capacity) with further capacity increases projected with development already approved in neighbouring local authorities. Whilst TMBC continues to refuse to instigate a Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) – an ineffective S106 system is being exploited by developers. The residents of Wateringbury continue to see no local improvements as a consequence or in mitigation of development. The proposed further additions to the local plan would total nearly 3000 homes – quadrupling the size of Wateringbury Village. An already overburdened infrastructure would collapse - the local primary school and Doctors surgery are already at capacity.
- Any proposed expansion of Kings Hill such as the proposed 59699, continues to threaten Wateringbury Village with secondary access routes – leading traffic off Kings Hill – directly into the Wateringbury Village centre. Whilst these may allow developers to meet statutory requirements for Emergency Vehicle access – they will disproportionately effect the surrounding areas. For this reason Kings Hill has

clearly reached its geographical limit and further expansion should be refused and green wedges maintained / installed around its surrounds thus protecting 'Landscapes of Local value'

• Site number 59655 is within the Wateringbury Parish and would only have access via Teston and Ketridge Lane – it is inappropriately/incorrectly listed as 'Kings Hill.'

### The Light that Shines in the Darkness

Hard to believe we are already in December! We have a range of Christmas services lined up for Wateringbury, West Peckham and Mereworth. Details are available on the enclosed Christmas Card and our website: mwwpchurches.org.

Christingle services, crib services and services of Nine Lessons and Carols are probably the most popular in many churches. These are attended for all sorts of reasons but I've always thought the sense of cosiness, the stirring of childhood memories and the pleasure of singing well- known words all hold a great attraction for many people – they certainly do for me. Central to all Christmas services is the good news that light has come into the world with the birth of Jesus Christ. As John says in his Gospel:

No-one has ever seen God, but the One and Only Son, who is at the Father's side, has made him known. (John 1:18).

With the birth of Jesus there need be no more wondering about whether God exists, what He is like and what He thinks of us. With the birth of Jesus Christ, we are left in no doubt that God is with us, for us, on our side and there for each one of us. The light has come and it shines in the darkness.

For this reason, candlelight plays an important part in all church services but especially those at Christmas. But as you sit in the church and look at the candles I wonder if you would dare open up yourself to let the light that is Jesus shine into you? The Christmas services, with their carols and readings from the Bible, are designed as an aid to dispel the darkness that is within each of us. We shall not come to experience for ourselves all the truth and grace of Jesus until such time as we are prepared to have the darkness cast out of us. Jesus, who came to save His people from their sins, begins that work of salvation in each one of us when we accept His command to repent and believe the Good News. Perhaps this Christmas you might like to pray using the following verse of a much-loved carol:
