#### Too much month at the end of the money?

At the present time day to day living is difficult if you are a low earning household or on benefits. With inflation running at a thirty year high, and this is not set to improve anytime soon, with issues such as the war in Ukraine which will affect our food prices, another energy price increase in October and fuel prices etc. It literally means, for some families, heating or eating. If you are desperate and finding you cannot cope with rising monthly expenses there is help available to you.

#### **Household Support Fund**

This is a £1 billion fund giving hard pressed households support for essentials such as food, utilities and clothing. A third of this pot is dedicated to pensioners. You need to apply through your local council.

#### **Food Banks**

We have many food banks within a short distance. The rules for entry to these facilities have now changed and you can now self refer.

#### GARDENING FOR WILDLIFE

Firstly, thank you to those of you that attended my Open Garden, we were so lucky with the weather and all our visitors showed a genuine interest in wildlife gardening which was very heartening.

The baby hedgehogs were again the main attraction but after them, the pond raised the most interest. It's not looking at its best at present as the water lilies have yet to cover the surface and the recent sunlight has caused algae blooms. The advice is to aim at covering approximately two thirds of the pond's surface with a mix of free floating and fixed root aquatic plants which should alleviate this problem. Regardless of this, visitors were fascinated with the tadpoles, or toadpoles, as mine all are, and I answered lots of questions about them along with ones relating to toads, frogs and newts.

As I've mentioned in previous editions, this month is 'No Mow May', when we are advised to leave even a small area of lawn unmowed, for at least a month. This will provide an additional habitat for wildlife, especially insects and any wild flowers that grow through will also provide a source of nectar and pollen.

Those of you that viewed my long grass area will know that creating a meadow isn't as easy as it sounds and my soil is too rich and the grass too strong. However, I plant bulbs, particularly fritillaries and other wild flowers into it and have allowed the dandelions to flourish at least until they start to set seed and the area still attracts pollinators. I will try a variety of the suggestions that some of you made as to how to move more towards a meadow in the Autumn such as an extra cut and scarify just before Christmas and have another go with yellow rattle. I'll let you know how I get on! *Pauline Knutton*

#### **APRIL PARISH COUNCIL NOTES**

The Public Discussion time was brought forward to the start of the meeting to see if this was more convenient for members of the public.

**Borough and County Councillor Sarah Hudson** reported on various issues of local concern. Her report appears in full on the next page.

**Cemetery Car Park** - the clauses requested by the landowner in respect of the purchase of the facility were generally agreed with the exception of one or two clauses.

**Cemetery –** Councillors are considering the feasibility of creating a Jubilee Memorial Garden at the cemetery.

**On-line Banking** – after discussion it was unanimously agreed to proceed with the process required to enable this method of payment of invoices, etc.to be used.

**Playing Fields** - it was agreed to re-stone some of the track to fill in potholes which had appeared over winter. It was hoped that the overflow car park would be used on a regular basis to reduce congestion in surrounding roads on match days.

**Play equipment** - it was possible to move the fencing from the bottom play area to the top area and for the bottom area to be returned to an open grassed area.

**Traffic matters** – Councillors had held an informative meeting with Kent Highways officers. Our local PCSO had conducted speed checks in the village in support of our volunteer speedwatch teams.

**Communication of information** to residents was discussed and ways to improve keeping residents informed were suggested.

Allotments - Councillors expressed their thanks to Cathie Wallis for her long service in being the liaison between

allotmenteers and the council. Cathie is standing down from this role and the Clerk will shortly meet with Ann Hipps who is taking over this role. There are at present 7 people on the waiting list for allotments.

**Village Warden** – there are three applicants for this role. Interviews will be arranged when it was hoped an appointment would be made.

**Planning** – Councillors had no objections to the general application and Listed Building Application for conversion of part of existing outbuilding into a one bedroom annex for ancillary use in connection with the farmhouse at Canon Court, 312 Canon Lane

The Annual Parish Council meeting is on Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> May at 7.30pm in the Upper Room of the Village Hall.

## NEWS FROM OUR BOROUGH AND COUNTY COUNCILLOR SARAH HUDSON

I am in contact with both TMBC and Kent Police about the "abandoned" vehicle on Bow Road. They each keep referring me to each other. At the end of the day, as the vehicle does not have a valid MOT, an offence is being committed, as no MOT invalidates the insurance. I have now gone back to Kent Police and await their response.

The Jubilee Picnic Celebrations are on Saturday 4th June, 4pm to 10pm down at the playing fields. I have organised a live band, DJ, bouncy castle and beer tent, as well as a horse box wine bar, and a visit from the ice cream van. A temporary event notice has been agreed by the council, and additional bins are being provided. Residents are asked to bring their own picnic and gazebo - in the hope that the weather is good!

The Community Market is back on Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> May, as the third Sunday in April was Easter Sunday, so was not held. The market has grown in size and now occupies both inside the village hall as well as the car park. Please do support local food producers, and remember you don't have to drive!

The Village Fete is on Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> June from 12.30 - 5pm. This includes a flower and produce show, and a dog show. We have the Kent Invicta Jazz band and lots of stalls. The community market is also on this date, so all stalls will be on the field. We hope everyone will come out to support us, and enjoy the day. The cricket club is once again running the BBQ, so lots of things for residents!

Following a lot of lobbying from myself, the installation company for the mobile phone mast have agreed to paint the cabinets a less intrusive colour. Green is what has been requested and the paperwork is being put together to be submitted to TMBC planning. The installation company are paying for this. The start date for the traffic calming measures and pavement installations is 23<sup>rd</sup> May, and should take 5 weeks approximately. Following the successful speed reduction Traffic Regulation Order, reducing the speed limit from 60mph to 40mph, along from Pizien Well Road to the village edge, the village gateways and improved road signage will start to go up.

Additionally, I am able to fund some planters that would sit on the Kent Highways land at Lodge Close and Love Lane entrances, and am investigating the possibility of some hanging baskets along the railings of Wateringbury Place too, which I would also buy. The premise is that I would seek sponsorship from village businesses (£25 per annum) for each planter to cover the cost of summer bedding plants each year.

I have funded the replacement Tommy for the bottom of Canon Lane, and this will be put up soon - just waiting on some replacement posts.

A Solar Farm is being built alongside the A228 opposite Kings Hill, generating enough electricity to power every house on Kings Hill.

At a recent scrutiny committee meeting, the issue of unaccompanied asylum seeking children was discussed. In recent years, the number in January was on average 12 for the month. This year it was 108, and in the first week of March alone was 28. This is having a significant impact on suitable resources and has involved multi agency support across multiple authorities. But it gives an indication on the scale of the problem.

## WATERINGBURY CE PRIMARY SCHOOL

It is hard to believe that we are about to start the summer term, the last term of the academic year. Whilst this is the first time in over two years that schools have been open for the whole academic year, it has been far from a normal year. The children have been working so hard and we have had a fantastic spring term.

As ever, the children have enjoyed their learning this term whether they have been writing stories about superheroes, experiencing elements of life in India, creating Mayan artefacts, designing magnetic games or inventing genetically modified creatures! The school has been alive with creativity.

The term ended on a real high with our Easter Performance by the children in years three and four. It was joyful to hear children singing and to be able to have parents in school to watch their children perform. We were all so proud of them – the singing was beautiful and portrayed the Easter story fantastically. PSCO Josh Vincent brought his car and kit onto the school playground so the children could have a go in the car – sorry to our neighbours for the repeated sirens. We loved having Josh in school and hope to have him back in the summer term to work with the children.

We are looking forward to lots of exciting events next term including a trip to a local farm, our Year 6 residential trip and the choir visiting the O2 (finally!) for Young Voices. I am sure there will be many more adventures to tell you about next month.

Next term we are also looking forward to saying hello to our new parents and will be holding an extra welcome afternoon on Thursday 28<sup>th</sup> April at 2pm for any parents who wish to come and have another look at our school.
