INSTALLATION OF NEW PLAY EQUIPMENT ON THE QUEEN ELIZABETH II PLAYING FIELDS.

Work is taking place to instal the new play equipment.. Playdale will erect Heras fencing only where they are working so that the existing play area will remain open for children to use. Two junior swings, two sheep springers and a play panel will be installed within the existing play area thanks to the grant from the National Lottery Community Fund, and the western end extension, will have a multiplay tower unit, a roundabout, two swings, two springers, a see-saw, and a play panel put in thanks to the grant from the FCC Communities Foundation.

Please note that some of the car park space will be required by the contractors for their vehicles and machinery. The Lower play area will remain open until after work on the upper play area has been completed. *Frances Fielding*

NEWS FROM SARAH HUDSON BOROUGH AND KCC COUNCILLOR CHAIR OF PARISH COUNCIL

Now that the local elections are over, the new administration has hit the ground running, and we have had several very productive meetings. Just last week, we heard how TMBC is making good progress in cutting its carbon emissions, as the third year of it's action plan comes to an end. The council has it's first electric vehicle, installed 28 EV charging points across the Borough, fitted 196 solar panels to the roof of Larkfield Leisure Centre, and changed to auto switch-off LED lighting in the council buildings. There is still more work to do, to reach our ambitious target to be carbon neutral by 2030.

A pilot scheme to crack down on littering and fly-tipping has seen more than 1,400 fixed penalty notices issued in its first six months All fly-tipping is investigated to see if there is any way of finding where the rubbish came from, but the vast majority is commercial waste, and untraceable. The Council is now considering a recommendation to tender for a permanent contract, with a focus on targeting fly-tippers.

A planning application has been submitted by Fergus Wilson to convert and extend the three consecutive properties he owns by the crossroads, and to build a four storey property of 7 flats. The planning application number is TM/23/01186/FL. Please do take the opportunity to have your say on this application.

The various village groups we are lucky to have, are all in need of new members, whether it is the WI, the Village Hall, or the Wateringbury Sports & Recreation Association. If you have some spare time, and would like to get more involved, please do get in touch. The Village Hall will be needing a new Chair and Treasurer in the next year or two, so now's the time to get more involved – you won't regret it!

And if you live near any of the flower troughs and barrels, please could you give them a water from time to time, especially in the hot weather – it would be really appreciated by the whole village!

Unfortunately the dog show, the ice cream van and temporarily the pizza dough were casualties of the high temperatures experienced over the weekend. New this year were the fairground rides (a big hit with the children), circus workshops, cake stalls, pizza van, vintage cars and morris dancers.

'WHERE MEMORIES MEET' – NEW PETITION FOR ACTION

Many residents in Wateringbury Village will be familiar with the ongoing problems Lucy has been experiencing due to the recurring flooding problems which blight her business at 'Where Memories Meet'. Blessed with a beautiful natural spring well in the basement, which also doubles up as an antiques and vintage clothing showroom, this great asset to our village life seems to have hit a brick wall with regards her situation.

The well is a 'pit stop' for a culverted water course that runs down Red Hill, through WMM and, theoretically, out through the drainage system under the cross roads. In practice this does not happen due to the drainage pipework's poor state of repair under the road. Kent County Council and private surveyors have used specialist equipment to establish the problem and the consistent conclusion is that the drain is not fit for purpose. Lucy has reached out to Councillors, our local MP Tom Tugendhat, Kent County Council and Southern Water. The vacuum of inaction has been disappointing to some residents, which is why they have helped Lucy prepare a petition to present to Kent County Council this summer. An e-petition is also in process with KCC.

The request is simple: Kent County Council needs to take its reparation responsibilities seriously and have this problem resolved by Autumn 2023, when the rains come again.

GARDENING FOR WILDLIFE

Summer is now definitely upon us and our gardens and the wildlife that they support need our help. Our main focus needs to be water and whether it's a pond or shallow trays of regularly topped up water; birds, insects and mammals will all appreciate our efforts and we may well be rewarded by being able to watch them from a safe distance.

The tadpoles from my own pond have all grown legs and hopped off into dark, damp and shady areas and there are currently two large toads living under the log pile. If you can create something similar in your own garden, this may attract not only frogs and toads but also beetles and other insects that are all beneficial.

The wildlife currently attracted to my pond is mainly Common Blue and Red Damselflies. These beautiful and fascinating insects flit across the surface of the water, find a mate and lay their eggs usually on something just under the surface. They are the same family as Dragonflies that are also using the pond and their names such as; Chaser, Darter and Hawker are a good reflection of their personalities. These insects have been around for millions of years and are one of the most successful group of hunters in the animal kingdom, with over a 95% success rate. They feed on small insects and mosquitos, so are another beneficial creature! This success rate is achieved partly by being able to fly in any direction, hover and see in 360 degrees. However, their most impressive achievement is that they can calculate the trajectory of their prey so can intersect it in mid-air rather that chasing it down. I hope that you all have a wonderful Summer enjoying your gardens and the wildlife that it supports. PK

MAY PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Election of Chair This is a new council since all councillors stood down at beginning of May at the end of their 4 year term. There was no need for a public election since Wateringbury is allowed 9 councillors and there were 8 candidates. Sarah Hudson was voted to chair the council for the coming term. Francis Fielding was unanimously elected to serve as vice-chair.

The first **Open Forum Session** was then scheduled to allow members to raise matters of concern. Discussions then took place on the following topics:

Acts of vandalism Concerns were expressed about the vandalism which had been occurring within the village particularly at the playing fields. It was hoped the four CCTV cameras at the playing fields would help to identify those causing hard. Residents were asked to report to the police any acts of vandalism, it was better to have more than one person report an incident than it go unreported. This will allow the police to build up an accurate picture of problems and hopefully prompt them to take action.

Wateringbury Sports and Recreation Association Members of sports associations who use the facilities were present and raised concerns about the administration of the Association. Councillor Hudson said that according to the constitution of this charity an annual general meeting had to take place before the end of May. At the AGM the committee for the coming year are elected. The village had excellent facilities and it was hoped that all associations would have one member on the future committee with a public meeting to be arranged in the Village Hall. **Crime Report** The police e-watch website showed the following 4 incidents in the village: Person unknown threw food at a car and then assaulted the driver on stopping; A red Mercedes CLV Coupe stolen from Bow Road: A window was broken in a Mitsubishi L200 parked in a field; An unsecured mountain bike was stolen from the park.

Borough & KCC Councillor's report Sarah Hudson reported that at the recent local T&M elections she and Matt Broughton had been elected to jointly serve the newly formed area of Malling Rural Eastwhich covers the villages of Wateringbury, Mereworth, East Peckham, West Peckham, Golden Green, Kings Hill and Hadlow. KCC were carrying out a public consultation on the proposals to improve the Kent Street junction on the road to Kings Hill. She urged residents to go on-line and express their views.

Finances - the new on-line bank account was now operational.

New play equipment – installation work will start on Monday 12th June.

Next meeting will be on Tuesday 6th June in the upper room of the village hall.

JUNE PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Co-option of Councillor- at the start of the meeting it was unanimously agreed that Emma Doyle be co-opted to serve on the council.

Sub committees representatives it was agreed the following representation: Kent Association of Local Councils (KALC) Cllr Stuart Mathieson Parish Partnership Panel (PPP) Cllr Sarah Hudson Allotments – Cllr Mandy Thwaites Highways – All councillors Planning – All councillors

Crime Report (*Source e-watch*) – On 23^{rd} May at Playing Fields, Bow Road Somebody set fire to some woods which spread to a summerhouse and two sheds. Councillor Hudson informed the meeting that the police had interviewed two people under caution.

At the first **Open Forum Session** the matters raised were:

The problems being experienced by the owner of Where Memories Meet over the blocked drains at the cross roads and down Bow Road which were causing flooding in her basement. A resident asked what could be done to help the business owner as it would appear that Southern Water and KCC are in dispute as to who is responsible for the drains and therefore their repair and meanwhile the business owner is suffering.

The overgrown pathways which run parallel to Bow Road. Councillor Hudson said the pathway was owned by Clarion Housing who were responsible for its upkeep.

The narrow pathway along the Tonbridge Road from the cemetery to Pizienwell which is overgrown and therefore difficult to walk along. Councillor Hudson said she had reported the matter and she hoped the pathway would be cleared soon.

Speed Watch – Village organiser David Merry attended the meeting and reported on the May speedwatch statistics. He also brought along a radar gun which was on loan and allowed the teams to monitor the speed of vehicles travelling in both directions. Councillors voted unanimously to purchase a radar gun for use by the village teams.

KCC Councillor Report - Councillor Hudson reported that KCC was facing many challenges to balance its budget. Adult Social Car costs had increased by a large amount. KCC was having to pay £200 per week more per person for those in care homes who were funded by KCC. Homeless funding support had also ceased.

As a vicar I often get requests for weather! What I mean is that people ask me to pray for good weather. Disappointed with the result people jokingly say, "God's not listening vicar!" and I always reply, "Yes He is, and He said 'No! 'But seriously, when the weather is what people want, they say things like: "We've been lucky with the weather, haven't we" or "The weather's been good to us." It is very rare, in my experience, to hear people giving God the credit.

Now, I do not believe that God is really after credit in the way we so often are. I think what He is after is for us to find the deep and lasting joy of getting to know Him who is the source of all that is good. The real gift is not the good gift itself, but the good giver who gives it. Perhaps God allows things to go against us and even go horribly wrong as a way of shaking us up to the fact we are ignoring Him. Jesus taught that our Father in heaven is an indiscriminately good giver causing the rain and sun to bless both the righteous and the unrighteous (Matthew 5:45). And one of Jesus' Apostles, St Paul, preached to the Greeks in Lystra that: 'God did not leave Himself without witness, for He did good and gave you from heaven rains and fruitful seasons, satisfying your hearts with food and gladness' (Acts 14:17).

I do think that even amidst the many difficulties, pains, and disappointments of life we can still count our blessings. Perhaps there are a good many of us at the moment who are thankful for one blessing or another despite, or perhaps even because of, all those difficulties, pains and disappointments.

I do hope that as you enjoy the summer with the many blessings that come with the holiday season you will have cause to reflect on the goodness of God. Why not come along to one of the many churches in our area, to a Sunday service, as a way of showing gratitude to God? That may even result in you coming to appreciate even more His interest in you, His care for you and His love for you.
