## VILLAGE HALL COVID UPDATE.

By the time you are reading this, under Step 3 of the Government Covid-19 Recovery Road Map (effective 17<sup>th</sup> May), most of our village hall regular activities should be running again. As required by government guidelines, we are currently on version 10 of this 50 page document, the hall has been made "Covid-19 Secure" and strict social distancing, cleaning and Track & Trace rules have to be followed by those using the hall. Some groups and activities have decided to wait for Step 4 of the Road Map before starting again, which at the time of writing is scheduled for 21<sup>st</sup> June. This is when the government hope to remove all legal limitations on social contact, which will mean social events, parties etc. can take place in the hall.

However it looks likely that the Step 4 date will slip and in addition some Covid rules will be retained. Until such time as Step 4 is achieved and any associated rules are known, we cannot accept firm bookings for any social activities/events. We have decided we will need a six week break after Step 4 to see how things settle down and to establish the arrangements required to have social events safely at the hall again.

So simply, the hall activities during this phase: **Road Map Step 4 (21<sup>st</sup> June?).** Authorised regular users only plus provisional bookings can be made for dates after 6th Aug. **From 6th August** authorised regular users plus agreed social events compliant with our Terms & Conditions and any remaining Special Conditions. N.B. if the 21<sup>st</sup> June date slips the 6<sup>th</sup> August will move correspondingly.

Our experience so far is that the social distancing rules work well with regular user activities as both the hirer and those attending are committed to the rules. We will need to achieve the same commitment between the hirer and those attending for social events.

## GARDENING FOR WILDLIFE IN WATERINGBURY

Firstly, I'd like to thank those of you that attended our Kent Wildlife Trust (KWT) 'Gardening for a Wilder Kent' event in my garden in April.

I was disappointed that the unseasonal weather meant that there were fewer flowers than expected. The early bulbs, heathers and pulmonarias are just finishing but many of the fruit trees are now in blossom. and they are buzzing with life!

In previous years we have been encouraged to adopt a 'No Mow May' strategy, leaving even a small area of lawn unmowed for at least a month. This allows wild flowers to grow through, encourages pollinating insects and provides food and habitats for a wide range of invertebrates including the caterpillars of butterflies and moths. Since we are about a month behind, perhaps we could all try this strategy until the end of the summer. The stars of my open garden were undoubtedly the two young hedgehogs that were brought by the 'Kent Mammal Group' on route to a new, safe home to be fed and watered for a few weeks before release.

Many visitors left with hedgehog home plans and a better understanding of how we can all support this threatened species. Providing water in a vessel that they can easily access is key (the birds will also benefit) as well as ensuring that they can travel from one garden to the next by leaving gaps in fences. Hedgehogs travel quite a distance in their search for food and have up to four different homes, so if you can get together with your neighbours to establish a 'wildlife corridor' you're more likely to see them in your own garden. #### A VIEW FROM THE PEW SADDLE: 'SECRET BIKE PARK HEAVEN'

"Take the left" the lead cyclist says and we veer off the main track onto a smaller, narrower, rougher track leading into dense sticky wood. I've never done anything like this in my life. It's a bit like that bit in Star Wars where the X Wings are skipping down the death star's trenches trying to avoid smashing into the sides, only here the sides are trees, the occasional branches and tight spots between trunks that we can hardly get the handlebars through. Sudden plunges down into little valleys and then the inevitable need to hit the pedals hard and climb the other side. Where is he taking us? "This way, just keep going" he shouts back. This is trust.

I am new to MTB (Mountain Biking). And I am totally addicted. It grew out of a couple of injuries due to running ('told you' I imagine some saying at this point.) I didn't have my own MTB but my son had one that he has grown out of that fits me (there is another whole discussion there about watching your children literally exceed you over time) ... another day. Thing was the Bike needed a lot of maintenance so for a couple of weeks I spent a few hours in the garage with YouTube and my brother on Skype as my lead advisors working through 'replacing tyres,' 'putting on a new chain', 'adding a new derailleur,' 'changing gear cables'. I had really enjoyed that. There is something in the science literature about the link between doing something technical with your fingers and your brain, and focus and relaxation. For some people its knitting, others lego, others prayer beads and me, at this point, changing bits of an old bike.

So the bike was renovated so I could join the pop up Bike Group. The injured runners became temporary MTB-ers with some experts to lead. 'Bike Park' is where the lead cyclist is taking us. (It is not far away but the location is strictly secret so shhhhh!) I had no idea what was coming. Shooting out of the narrow woods suddenly we fly over a bump and the land just falls away to what feels almost vertical over a little 'cliff edge' and frankly its terrifying. We hurtle down and then up and bounce over the next bumpy ridge. Both wheels, for a fraction of a second, actually leave the ground. Then into the next corner and bump and drop and rise. I am laughing hysterically. It's like a roller coaster. One drop and rise after another, each seeming more ludicrously impossible. 'Heaven is a Bike park' I think.

The thing is when you go over the edge you just have to commit to the drop. You cannot break. You are in full flight and there is only one option. You have to focus entirely on the moment because if you think about anything else you might just stack it. We are all of an age that 'stacking it' requires longer recovery time than the young (Jealous? Me? Certainly not!!!). Totally unnecessarily risky. Bliss.

Later, at the end of the excursion debrief, there is a discussion about thoughts of 'what happens if we stack it and can't work and the business goes under and . . ." I just don't get those thoughts. I just get 'wheeeeeeeeee'. I am not really sure what, if any of this is particularly 'theological'. I once attended a seminar on the theology of driving (given by a priest who I think quite liked driving.) I can't remember much about it. Perhaps there is something about being out in the world, being attached to something that connects with you, connects to the world in a vivid and fully embodied way, and then takes you, with a few others, into moments and spaces that are . . . well not quite of this world. It certainly takes me back to that child's eye view of the world that newly looks upon experience and seeks to connect; maybe in ways we grownups might from time to time lose sight of. Maybe there is a spirituality of MTB-ing? Or maybe it is just an adrenaline fix with a bunch of mates 'at a certain time of life' at the end of the week. I don't mind either way. *Bob Bowie*

## **CHURCH ANNUAL MEETING**

The Annual Meeting was held by Zoom on 11<sup>th</sup> May and was well attended.

**Election of Church Wardens** At the Annual Vestry meeting two nominations were received for **Elizabeth Gummer** and **Peter Bond** who were duly elected. Rev Gary thanked them both for their past and continued service to the parish, a sentiment echoed by all present.

Electoral Roll There are 74 people on the roll.

Accounts Church Treasurer Jane Hambly thanked Peter for his help with the accounts as she was new to the roll. Peter Bond expressed his sincere thanks to everyone who had maintained their regular donations to the church over the past year in exceptionally challenging times which had left the church in a secure financial position.

**Church Wardens' Fabric Report** There are no major concerns re the condition of the building. A handrail along the entrance path had been installed and is proving a useful aid.

**Church Wardens' Pastoral Report** Peter and Liz expressed sincere thanks to all those who have assisted in Covid times to help deal with the necessary restrictions.

**Vicar's Report** Rev Gary said it had been a joy to worship across the benefice and he thanked all at SJB for their support and warm welcome. He and Sharon look forward to everything the Lord has in store for us all in the coming year.

**PCC Lay representatives**. Those elected to serve on the Parochial Church Council are: Alastair Byron, Christine Byron, Alice English, Barry Fisher, David Merry, Kate Millar, Eddie Scarlin, Gordon Self, Sheena Stewart and Mike Witts. Rev Gary thanked all for their service and commented it was lovely to have a full PCC who worked so well together.

### **Any Other Business**

Barry asked the meeting's opinion of the proposal by KCC to put a pedestrian island in the A26 opposite the church and use the church layby as road carriageway to make it wide enough for a central island. The church standing committee had been told of the proposal last December and had expressed their grave concerns about the loss of the lay-by. What would happen to funeral and bridal cars? What about parking for those attending church and social activities? The layby is often used by drivers to take mobile phone calls and for general day-to-day parking. There was no other parking and often cars are parked up to Lodge Close. After a general discussion it was agreed that volume and speed of traffic were problematic but that this proposal was not the answer. All present expressed their overwhelming opposition to the scheme. #### **OPEN AIR WORSHIP**

In my sermon in Wateringbury for Rogation Sunday I talked about the blessings which God gives us in clean water, food and fresh air and our prayers are to be for these. The London Parks are great examples of these outdoor blessings and I referred to worship al fresco especially the massive Prayer Vigil for 80,000 people led by Pope Benedict XVI on 18 September 2010 in Hyde Park.

On Rogation Sunday we would normally be outside walking through the fields and asking (rogare) a blessing on the crops. But like other services these have been cancelled over the past year. Open Air services have played a part for many of us in our spiritual development. Firstly there has been the Good Friday Walk of Witness which is common across the country. People carry the cross through the streets and have stations for prayers and readings. At West Malling it is one of the biggest services of the year and draws from all denominations, stopping in the Abbey and at other places such as outside Tesco. As it has become bigger so it has taken longer. Palm Sunday has an outdoor dimension and the only hymn sung so far this year at West Peckham was in the churchyard as we processed singing 'All glory, laud and honour'. Most churches will carry their palms with a ceremony in the churchyard.

A lot of pilgrimages have begun these past few years and some have appeared on television most notably the Camino de Santiago, St James Compostella in Spain and the routes to Lough Derg in the Irish borderlands. Two years ago we inaugurated a local pilgrimage from Old East Peckham church (St Michael's) to St Dunstan's West Peckham, then to Holy Trinity, East Peckham and back up to St Michael on the high ridge. We have walked it again during the Covid and it is delightful. Climbing back up to St Michael reminded me of our time at Oberammergau when we stayed at Imst in Austria and had to take part in the night-time ascent to the Lawrencehutte, carrying flares to light our way. It was steep and daunting but we love St Lawrence who is associated with flames.

Also in 2000 we went on a Rochester diocesan pilgrimage to the Holy Land led by Bishop Nazir Ali. Many of the services were in the open air. The very first was in the Shepherds' Fields in Bethlehem where I had to act as cantor and sing out the opening line of 'While Shepherds watched'. Then we had a service on the boat as we sailed across the Sea of Galilee - this included throwing a net into the dark waters. My favourite service was in the Roman amphitheatre at Caesarea from where St Paul set sail for Rome and we held a communion service as the Mediterranean lapped at the shore behind us.

Finally our next outdoor service at Mereworth will be the V.C. Service at the grave of Admiral Lucas on 27 June. He was the first recipient of the honour. The sea cadets attend and we read the description of his brave action in the Crimean War and have a two minute silence. It will be the first Sunday after the end of the lockdown then and we can breathe a sigh of relief in the open air as did all those whose lives Lucas saved by thinking not of himself but of others. *Canon Brian Stevenson* 

# APRIL HIGHWAYS AND TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE NOTES

Cllr Fielding reported receiving a considerable number of responses to the *Village Road Traffic Suggestions*. She was still expecting more responses and will analyse and compile a list of problems and proposed solutions.

The Parish Council (PC) will engage **a specialist consultant** to advise on feasibility of the proposed traffic solutions before presenting them to KCC Highways. PC felt that it should strengthen their position dealing with KCC who are not responsive to PC's requests, e.g. ignoring the request for 40mph speed limit in the approach to the village from Pizienwell Rd, although there is such a limit on the approach to Hadlow, also on A26. KCC informed PC in the past that a 20 mph speed limit from the traffic lights to the Railway pub would need to be self-policed by installing traffic calming measures at the PC cost.

Present at the meeting were two **representatives from Nettlestead**. They have similar traffic problems and wanted to learn and support PC plans to reduce speed in Bow Rd and ban heavy lorries over 5 tonnes from both villages.

In the **public discussion** two main issues were raised: the high level of **pollution** generated by heavy traffic flow; the **damage** caused by vibrations to 337 Tonbridge Rd (cracks in walls and ceilings, tiles falling from the roof and distortion of a door frame). The road by 337 is too narrow for large lorries to pass each other and the pavement opposite is very dangerous for pedestrians

#### MAY PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

**Election of chair for coming year** - No members of the council offered to stand for election as chair so, under the rules, the present chair Michael Wells will remain in post on a month by month basis until a new chair is appointed.

Election of vice chair - Patrick Gregson was unanimously elected Co-option of Councillors - Christian Ball and Geraint Owen

expressed a desire to serve on the council and, were unanimously co-opted to the parish council.

Report from Borough Councillor Sarah Hudson - The Community tidy up on

 $1^{\mbox{st}}$  May had been well supported with as many as 20 people working in Bow Road and in

the car park. Ivy has been removed and the fence will be painted by members of Grow 19 College, East Malling. Planters had also been provided on the central reservation. Sarah had funded the project from her Borough Councillor's budget.

Mr Roger Roud, has been elected Mayor by T&MBC.

**Crime Report** - Ewatch has reported the theft of a purse and bank card which had been used. Councillor Hudson understood an arrest had been made.

**Playing Fields -** A site meeting with the contractor had been held regarding the track from Fields Lane and a quote was awaited. A quote to repair damaged rope at the play area was accepted. Councillors unanimously agreed to accept a quote of £75 from Playsafe for regular inspections of the play equipment.

**Village Hall Wall** - Following a site inspection a quote was awaited for repairs to the wall which had previously been damaged.

**Speedwatch** - the team was now up to full strength as more volunteers joined. The team was thanked for its continuing work. The number of vehicles reported to the police as speeding at various locations on the village roads continues to rise.

**Cemetery** – compliments on its good condition had been received. **Annual Government Statement/ Return for year** - Councillors unanimously approved the details on the form and arranged to sign and submit it.

Arrangements for June meeting - Due to the cessation of the National Dispensation on 6<sup>th</sup> May to allow councils to meet virtually councillors were asked to pass a resolution (Resolution 101) to allow the Parish Council (PC) to suspend all future meetings and delegate certain decisions to the parish clerk and two councillors. All councillors would be emailed prior to any decisions being made. A large venue would be needed to allow for safe social distancing to be maintained. The main hall in the village hall was not available and the upper meeting room usually used by PC was too small to meet the Covid criteria. The school hall was suggested for PC meetings but in the absence of a firm booking the resolution needed to be adopted and after discussion was unanimously agreed. Subsequently, a majority decision has been taken not to have a PC meeting on the 1st June.

**Public discussion** - A resident raised concerns about the proposal by KCC to create a gateway with a mandatory 50mph limit close to the junction of the A26 with Pizienwell Road. PC were working to achieve a 40mph limit on this approach to the village, so why are KCC not listening?

**Planning** - PC commented on the following planning applications: <u>Coppice Court, Teston Road</u> (retrospective) Resiting of building for dog training by 3 metres as a metal pipe had been found and the owner of the pipe could not be traced. (*No objections*)

<u>5 Hanbury Close</u> Garage conversion and creation of bike store (*No objections*)

White Cottage 171 Tonbridge RoadListed building consent to divideexisting large family bathroom to form one ensuite and one family bathroom:restoration of western chimney (No objections relying on the conservationofficer to ensure the integrity of the listed building is maintained)501 Red Hillchange of entry on to Teston Road (No objections)3 Upper Mill26. Objections had been raised by neighbours. PC had reservations, inparticular, the safety aspect of the exit from the proposed driveway onto A26.
