SEPTEMBER PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

KCC Councillor Matthew Balfour said some difficult decisions would need to be made as, due to funding cuts from Central Government, KCC had to make savings of £80 million in the next financial year. £1 million would need to be cut from bus services. Only 3% of bus routes were subsidised. He was looking into the problems of pupils travelling from the village to Mascalls School in Paddock Wood. Matthew spoke of Community Bus services which may be the answer. A couple of schemes are being successfully operated by volunteers who drive a 12 seater mini bus which is funded by KCC.

<u>Cross Roads</u> There was not enough room to site a roundabout: other engineering options are still being investigated. The high levels of pollution were a real problem. It was the duty of the Borough Council to monitor air quality, KCC had no statutory responsibilities and so no authority is obliged to solve such problems. Richard Tripp remarked that he was pleased that air quality was moving up the political agenda.

<u>Rail Franchise renewal</u> national government are handling the renewal of the franchise. Three companies had put in bids to run our local line. Maintaining the Medway Valley Line, which runs through Wateringbury, was a priority request from KCC.

<u>Road Signs hidden by vegetation</u> in response to a question Matthew said it was the responsibility of the land-owner to ensure that road signs were kept clear.

Borough Councillor Simon Jessel reported on local matters but said the main focus was how to maintain essential and statutory services while balancing the budget. Further cuts of 30% in funding from Central Government are in the pipe-line over the next 3 years on top of those already made.

Allotments There were now 2 vacant plots. Anyone wishing to rent a plot should contact the parish clerk. **Cemetery** Councillors voted to accept a quote from A & F Services to remove the car park hedge and replace it with a post and rail fence.

War News, October 1917

October

- 4: Battle of Broodseinde (part of Passchendaele campaign
- 9: Battle of Poecapelle (part of Passchendaele campaign)
- 26: Passchendaele campaign recommences after 2 week lull.

October 1917 was a bloody month for the village.

Arthur Jessup, aged 36, died on 1st October in the Passchendaele campaign. In 1890 the Wateringbury School log records him fainting from hunger and the school managers paying his school fees of 2 shillings. He came from a poor family in Pizien Well where his mother still lived in 1911, although Arthur had, by then, moved from the village. Arthur won in 1916 the Distinguished Conduct Medal (D.C.M.), one of the only two village men to do so during the war. He is buried at Kandahar Farm Cemetery, Wulvergem, Belgium.

A few days after Arthur, **John Dumbrell**, aged 20, was killed on the same front. John was from Nettlestead but had attended Wateringbury School. He is one of the 35,000 missing commemorated on the Tyne Cot Memorial at Passchendaele, Belgium.

On the 26th **William Pearson**, aged 30, was killed. His roots were Pizien Well and Nettlestead but, unlike Arthur and John, he had not attended Wateringbury School. He was serving with the 1st Battalion, Royal West Kents, whose regimental history records the day of his death as "the "worst day in the [1st] battalion's experiences in the war." "Those who were wounded at any distance from our line had no chance of extricating themselves from the awful mud which was the dominating feature of the day". The battalion lost 348 of 581 men involved. William is buried, at Hooge Crater Cemetery, 4 kms east of Ypres, Belgium. His wife, Ellen, was then living at 4, Glenleigh Terrace, Nettlestead.

We can imagine the rumours that would have been circulating in the village associated with the losses at Passchendaele. Air raids continued to generate fear as well. The Girls School log records that Gwendoline Mercer from Canning Town was admitted to the school "on account of the air raids". In WWII there was an organised evacuation of children, Operation Pied Piper, but in WWI it was a private initiative. The school children were busy collecting horse chestnuts, part of a country-wide effort to produce explosives from non-imported sources, but at the time no one understood why. An inquest jury, meeting at *The Railway*, concluded that, a baby from a hopping family who had died, had been killed by exposure to a German gas bomb attack in London. This is highly unlikely but shows the general febrile state of mind at the time.

In contrast some things went on as normal. Mrs. Spittles of Old Road's testimonial to *Clarke's Blood Mixture* featured in a nation-wide advertising campaign. Although the ad is on the following page, unfortunately, this marvellous mixture was withdrawn from the market in 1968. *Terry Bird*

VILLAGE BLUE PLAQUES UNVEILING WALK

On Saturday 9 September Wateringbury unveiled Blue Plaques to celebrate 7 people with village connections whose lives have helped shape our world.

Approximately 80 people, including the Mayor of T & M Councillor Roger Dalton, Mrs Crawford-Usher head teacher of our school, Rev Nick Williams, and a couple of dogs, gathered at the South Entrance to Wateringbury Place where Lucy Williamson unveiled the plaque to her great x 4 grandfather Matthias Prime Lucas, owner of Wateringbury Place Estate and Lord Mayor of London in 1827.

Walkers then progressed along the Tonbridge Road to Cross House, next to the Post Office, which was the birthplace in 1807 of John Beal Jude, founder of The Kent Brewery. His 3 x great grandson Thomas, who was brought up in the village, spoke of his life.

The next stop was at the oldest house in the village, The Wardens, just off Bow Road, where in 1833 Ralph Fremlin, founder of Fremlin's Brewery, Maidstone was born. The mayor unveiled this plaque telling of Ralph's life and his own boyhood memories of the area.

At The Beck, Mill Lane, about 20 more joined the walkers. Frances English, representing the Royal British Legion, spoke of the career of Admiral Sir Henry Ruthven Moore, and her mother-in-law Elizabeth recounted the part the Admiral had played in introducing her to her husband Mark.

Opposite, at The Thatched House, Richard Tripp, chairman of our Parish Council before unveiling the plaque told of the Koh i Noor diamond and the part played in its story by Lady Lena Login.

The last stop of the morning was to The Red House for the plaque commemorating Dame Ellen Terry who celebrated her 80th Birthday there. Rick Schembri, representing Wateringbury Players, read the tribute written to Dame Ellen by Oscar Wilde and Olivia Curtis of the Kent Acting Studio, recited a Shakespeare Sonnet on Love. In 1928 2 girls from the school took a basket of primroses to the house as a birthday gift for Dame Ellen. On Saturday Martha Bowie and Catherine Stockham, pupils at the school, presented a basket of flowers to the present owner's mother.

The walk ended at the church where many enjoyed refreshments and browsed the history displays. The unveilings concluded at 3pm when Professor John Zarnecki, President of the Royal Astronomical Society, and nearly 40 visitors walked down Mill Lane to Brooms Down where the Professor outlined the many achievements of William Rutter Dawes who while living in the village independently discovered the interior dark inner ring of Saturn in 1850.

Each of the blue plaques (which were supplied and fitted by Maidstone Signs) displays a QR code so, with a mobile phone, information on each of the plaque people can be accessed. We hope the circular walk of about 1 mile will be enjoyed by many present-day residents and visitors to our special village.

Special thanks to all the property owners and the Parish and T & M councils for their co-operation and to Dail Whiting for her help and advice.

We are in many ways in something of 'quiet time' before the start of the incredibly busy time of November and the run up to Christmas. The new service pattern at Teston is in place and has been positively received so if you would like to attend something a little different in the benefice try one of their new services.

The 'nave altar' experiment at Wateringbury is drawing to a close and we are collating the many frank and honest comments that have been received before the PCC makes a final decision as to whether or not to continue with it.
