RIP Sylvia Robin Buss 21 September 1933-8 October 2022

Sylvia and Trevor Buss moved to Wateringbury in 1995 after they both retired from East Malling Research Station. Trevor passed away in 2004, but Sylvia stayed on in Warden Mill Close until 2018. She loved the village, living by the apple orchards. She was a member of St John's church, had her hair done across the road, and was part of this friendly village. She also delivered Rostrum, and even published a poem in this very magazine. In 2018, despite care from the surgery, it became clear she couldn't live alone any more, and she moved into a Wallingford care home near her son. On 8th October she passed away after a long illness.

Farewell to Syd Thompsett who has recently left the village to be closer to family and now lives in Whiteplains Care Home, Denham where he is very happy. Syd first came to Wateringbury in July 1947 to work as Senior Assistant to the Chief Surveyor of the Whitbread Brewery at Phoenix Brewery in Bow Road. It was there that he met his wife Vera. In 1967 Syd and Vera bought a plot of land in Red Hill and designed and built the bungalow which he has recently sold. He became very active in village life. He played for Wateringbury Football Club and was a member of the team that won the Maidstone Challenge cup, the first trophy won by the club for 50 years. He served on the Parochial Church Council and for several years organised an annual Summer Fete and Christmas Fair. He served on the Parish Council Highways Committee and was in the team which succeeded in getting heavy lorries banned from Bow Road. He was a founder member of the History Society and took an active part in its running and became its first life member. For many years Syd delivered Rostrums too. He has been a trustee of the Working Men's Club for many years. So thank you Syd for all you have done to enrich village life. Syd, in turn, wishes to thank his many friends and neighbours for their help and support over the years.

QUEEN ELIZABETH II memories

Emily and I went to London on the Saturday afternoon before the Queen's State Funeral on Monday and joined the Access queue which went 1.25 times round the Tate Britain building block. It was very well organised and there were lots of Navy, Air Force and soldiers marshalling as well as Police and Scout and Guide leaders. There was also a Faith team talking to people. We were offered bottles of water, chocolate brioche, chairs (to use and carry with us!) and, late in the afternoon, blankets.

We finally got our wristbands at 6.30pm for a 2.00-3.00am slot! After a quick chat we decided that we'd get the train home, grab some food and drink as well as change into guiders' uniform and we returned to London by car. We passed through the security checks having given up our sealed bottle of water, hand gel and the battery from my torch, and we were cleared to enter Westminster Hall.

We paused at the coffin, saluted, and bent our heads before moving on and out into the dark. It was a unique experience - London at 1.30 in the morning never seemed safer with masses of police, military personnel, and marshals everywhere. We could cross the road outside Big Ben without needing to look either way or wait for the traffic lights as there was no traffic. A surreal and sombre day which neither of us will ever forget. A First-Hand Account of The Queen's Funeral

Waking up at 3am was challenging as we planned to catch the first train from Tonbridge to Charing Cross. We expected to see the station packed full of people, much to our surprise however, all was subdued and guiet.

Upon leaving the station people began to merge from around the City moving with purpose towards Trafalgar Square. We initially planned to arrive at the Mall however our route was blocked and my mother and I were ushered towards horse guards parade. At the time this felt frustrating, how wrong we were. By 6.30am we had reached our destination. It was less busy than expected, we soon became comfortable; the people around us were eccentric, kind and patient.

After 5 hours the service begun. Everyone stood in silence, a few sung along to the hymns and all the prayers where said. For the 2-minute silence the whole city stood still.

Around 12:15 the procession began. The troupes had lined up and were ready to march. The slow, repetitive drum echoed throughout London bringing a stop to all. The soldiers processed section by section, each after the other, with perfect accuracy. Next came the Queen's Coffin, The King and other royal family members. Everyone fell silent. Men, women and children bowed their heads out of respect.

Once the event was over, thousands flocked home. So did we. Late evening trains were filled with bittersweet conversations about that day's endeavours, reminiscing on an event that shall never leave our memories.

GARDENING FOR WILDLIFE

The last of our Summer visitors, the swifts, left for Africa in mid October this year. These amazing birds spend more time in the air than any other and even spend the night on the wing. They eat great quantities of flying insects and nest in gaps in stonework and under roofs although you can purchase specially designed nest boxes if you want to attract them.

The wildlife that is remaining here for the Winter is busy preparing and we can help in a variety of ways. For example: leave windfall apples on the ground somewhere so that birds and other wildlife can enjoy them. You may exen attract Fieldfare and Redwings into your garden. These beautiful birds are members of the Thrush family and arrive from Northern Europe during October.

We all want our gardens to look tidy in readiness for Winter and it is tempting to cut everything back, but if you can leave this until the Spring, you will be providing a food source for a variety of wildlife from the seed heads, whilst the hollow stems provide shelter for a range of insects. With a dew on these plants or a frost, your garden will take on a magical element and so will still look attractive.

Finally, if you have got a pond, now is the time to remove any dead vegetation amd maybe put a net over th top to catch the Autumn leaves, which can be collected and stored to make leaf mould for next year.

NEWS FROM BOROUGH & KCC COUNCILLOR SARAH HUDSON

The traffic calming measures carried out over the summer still have a few snagging issues, including some additional road markings such as 40mph roundels outside the cemetery. These are awaiting road space and will be completed soon.

I have bought some additional wooden flower planters to plant and place along the A26 within the village, with 30mph stickers, to act as reminders to drivers that they are in a 30 zone. It also makes the village more village like apparently, so encourages speed reduction.

The pavement along the A26 from Pizien Well Road to Canon Lane has been cleared of weeds and undergrowth, and Hugh Lowe farms have very kindly removed some of the worst of the falling over hedging to make the pedestrian footpath more accessible. And the pavement up Red Hill has been completely resurfaced.

Thank you to everyone who attended the public meeting on The Local Plan consultation recently. A reminder that the consultation closes on 3rd November, so please do take the opportunity to voice your opinions.

GUIDES

On Saturday 2 October it felt as if Kent Weald Girlguiding had taken over the village and surrounds. The event was Challenge Invicta which is run every year in October and moves around Kent, but for the first time that I was aware of, it was based in our very own back yard. The route was 10km assuming they followed the correct route and along the way there were seven bases where the girls had to work as a team and tackle whatever challenge was presented. There was a checkpoint at the top of Love Lane with marshals to see the girls across the road safely and ensure they were generally heading in the right direction. We were so lucky with the weather - last year it bucketed all day and the event was closed early but this year as a marshal it was very nice sitting in our chairs checking the teams through. We entered two teams of guides and out of 30 guide teams, we had one come an amazing 5th and the other which was a very inexperienced team came 17th which for a first time was brilliant. Thank you to Lisa Dean for her brilliant map tuition, and to everyone who stopped to speak to us and find out what we were doing. Thanks to everyone who provided a venue for a base, and apologies to anyone who passed the school as everyone was arriving or leaving as it was a little manic. OCTOBER PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Following the removal of the public phone box in Bow Road any notices stating this to be the nearest public phone box for emergency use will need to be amended.

The first draft of the Parish Council budget for 2023/24 will be discussed on 15^{th} November at a meeting of the Finance and General Purposes committee of the Council which will be held at 7.30pm in the village hall upper room. Members of the public will be welcome.

Proposal for ashes memorial garden in the cemetery. Following the resignation of David Marks from the Council, and following his appointment as chair of the Sports and Recreation Association, the resignation from the subcommittee of Councillor Richard Tripp, Councillor Lyn Simmons appealed for others to join her to take the plans forward.

Crime Report – the following crimes were shown on the police web site: Violence and sexual behaviour 5, Anti social behaviour 2, other theft 1, public order 1.

Play Equipment – during the period 2010 to 2022 repairs to play equipment at the playing fields had cost the council £67,000. This was more than the original cost of the equipment. The costs of repairs will therefore be a major consideration when any new play equipment is acquired.

Parish Clerk – councillors spent some time discussing the pay, hours and job description and interviews for a new parish clerk to replace Sue Cockburn who is retiring on $30^{\rm th}$ November having been in post for 25 years. Interviews are due to be held on $11^{\rm th}$ October.

Sports & Recreation Association – following his appointment as chair of the Trustees of the Association, Councillor Tripp outlined proposals being discussed with regard to the day to day running of the sports facilities and the possible change of name to better reflect its activities. The entire facilities have been booked for Saturday 13th May 2023 for the Football Festival organised by the local football club and Sunday 11th June 2023 for the Village Fete.

Planning Applications – Councillors had no objections to the application to build three detached three bedroom dwellings with double garages and associated works on land at the junction of Red Hill and Barming Road.

Next Meetings – there are two meetings in November to which members of the public are very welcome. **Tuesday**

1st November for the usual business meeting and Tuesday 15th November for the Finances and General Purposes Committee which will discuss the first draft of the budget for 2023/24. Both meetings will be in the upper room of the village hall and start at 7.30pm. Approved minutes of council meetings will appear on the Parish Council website www.wateringbury pc.org.uk in due course

COVER PICTURE - COMMONWEALTH WAR GRAVE

There is only one Commonwealth War Graves Commission grave in the village cemetery - that of Sergeant Kenneth Alfred Brooks 1801977. Royal Airforce Volunteer Reserve. He died on Thursday 31st December 1942 aged 19 at or near Upper Heyford, Oxfordshire when the Wellington in which he was bomb aimer crashed. Before joining the RAF in February 1942 he worked in the offices of the Phoenix Brewery in Bow Road. Kenny and his family lived at 2 Broomscroft Cottages, Canon Lane which at the time were farm cottages owned by the Blest family. It was to his family home that the RAF colour party carried his coffin from Wateringbury station, draped in a Union Jack. His coffin remained in his family home over-night before his funeral service and burial. His brother recalled that the RAF were anxious to take the flag back with them as they were in short supply. Shortly before lockdown the War Grave Commission notice was placed on the cemetery gate and his headstone cleaned by the Commission. For many years his brother Joe returned to the village and laid the Parish Council's wreath at the War Memorial. Family members still visit and lay a wreath on Kenny's grave. (Information from Dail Whiting and Lest We Forget – Wateringbury in WW2)

The Remembrance Continues

I suspect that this year's Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday observances will be marked with a special poignancy given that these will be the first following the death of our beloved Queen Elizabeth II. Doubtless it will be particularly poignant for King Charles III and the Royal Family. Her Majesty's absence from the big, televised events we are so used to seeing will not go unnoticed or pass without comment in the media. She herself served in the Second World War. In 1944 when she was just 18 years old, Princess Elizabeth joined the ATS and before that she lent her support to the *Dig for Victory* campaign. Furthermore, she did a broadcast for *Children's Hour* for the benefit of children, like herself at the time, who had to be evacuated from their homes. And of course, Her Majesty went on to being linked with all branches of the Armed Forces in various ways.

So, Her Majesty's absence at this year's acts of remembrance will mark a huge change in what we are used to. But the observances will continue and we ought to pray for King Charles as he now takes his place in all the proceedings for so long admirably attended and so well served by his mother. Details of the service for Remembrance Sunday can be found in this November edition of Rostrum. I would also like to draw your attention to the Armistice Day Observance that I hold at the war memorial outside Mereworth Church. We'll gather at 10:45 for a ceremony there at the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month. Please do join me there and I think it's worth remembering that the Armistice Day observance was instituted by His Majesty's greatgrandfather, King George V.

So, monarchs come and monarchs go but the remembering of them and of those who have given their lives in sacrifice for our nation continue. The last Sunday in November this year marks the beginning of the Christian season of Advent. In that season we remember the coming of the monarch Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II openly acknowledged as her Lord and King – King Jesus. In Advent many of us Christians put our focus on the coming into this world of the King of Kings; not only His first coming to live, suffer and die for our sins but also His future return when He shall come to judge the living and the dead. He is the monarch who has been and gone, and who is and shall be again.

The Remembrance Continues

I suspect that this year's Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday observances will be marked with a special poignancy given that these will be the first following the death of our beloved Queen Elizabeth II. Doubtless it will be particularly poignant for King Charles III and the Royal Family. Her Majesty's absence from the big, televised events we are so used to seeing will not go unnoticed or pass without comment in the media. She herself served in the Second World War. In 1944 when she was just 18 years old, Princess Elizabeth joined the ATS and before that she lent her support to the *Dig for Victory* campaign. Furthermore, she did a broadcast for *Children's Hour* for the benefit of children, like herself at the time, who had to be evacuated from their homes. And of course, Her Majesty went on to being linked with all branches of the Armed Forces in various ways.

So, Her Majesty's absence at this year's acts of remembrance will mark a huge change in what we are used to. But the observances will continue and we ought to pray for King Charles as he now takes his place in all the proceedings for so long admirably attended and so well served by his mother. Details of the service for Remembrance Sunday can be found in this November edition of Rostrum. I would also like to draw your attention to the Armistice Day Observance that I hold at the war memorial outside Mereworth Church. We'll gather at 10:45 for a ceremony there at the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month. Please do join me there and I think it's worth remembering that the Armistice Day observance was instituted by His Majesty's greatgrandfather, King George V.

So, monarchs come and monarchs go but the remembering of them and of those who have given their lives in sacrifice for our nation continue. The last Sunday in November this year marks the beginning of the Christian season of Advent. In that season we remember the coming of the monarch Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II openly acknowledged as her Lord and King – King Jesus. In Advent many of us Christians put our focus on the coming into this world of the King of Kings; not only His first coming to live, suffer and die for our sins but also His future return when He shall come to judge the living and the dead.
