#### **REST IN PEACE**

#### John Piper 26.02.45-3.12.19

John Piper of Glebe Meadow, passed away 3rd December 2019 in Maidstone Hospital aged 74. John lived most his adult life in Glebe Meadow with his wife Pam and their 3 sons Derek, Lee and Ian. The Funeral took place on 17th December in St John the Baptist church then for Burial in the cemetery. John will be mostly remembered for his running of the entertainments in Wateringbury Working Men's Club for many years.

John moved to Wateringbury in the 1970s where he later settled into family life with wife, Mary and daughters, Sarah and Anna. His early career was in "The Print" working for a time on The Eagle comic at Hulton Press in Fleet Street. Later, he ran his own business Harperset, a graphic design/printing/publishing company based in Eccles. John had served in the RAF and was greatly interested in events from World War II. John died just before Christmas.

Anne was a very special lady, she loved people and in her gentle, caring way she put her Christian Faith into action helping, loving, listening and supporting countless people. She loved the simple things in life and found the good in everyone she met. The world will miss her goodness and charity.

#### WATERINGBURY CE PRIMARY SCHOOL

One of the wettest winters on record hasn't deterred our children from taking to the outdoors. Our children took part in the RSPB's Big Schools' Birdwatch 2020 under the careful tutelage of Alice Yelf who had to persuade a group of children that a magpie really wasn't a golden eagle.

Year 4 enjoyed a brilliant workshop on portraiture at the National Gallery in London which will enhance their work on local history and their study of the portraits of the workers in industries critical to Wateringbury's growth and prosperity. Our Senior Choir members took to the stage at Wembley Arena, joined by 4,000 other school choir members, as part of the Young Voices series of concerts. The children worked hard each week leading up to the concert to learn the music, lyrics and actions. The massed choir is accompanied by professional musicians and stars and the evening was a gala performance.

Our annual Shakespeare production, A Midsummer Night's Dream, was staged by our Year 5 class who added a number of song and dance routines to bring the story to life. The class wove original Shakespearean lines with their own to produce a unique version which Shakespeare himself would have loved! The study of the play began with a visit to The Globe Theatre in London.

Following the half-term, children were busy in classrooms demonstrating their arithmetic methods to parents as part of our Maths Forum workshops. Digital leaders marked Safer Internet Day with an important assembly about e-Safety and how to manage online activity with safety.

## NEWS FROM OUR BOROUGH COUNCILLOR SARAH HUDSON

Speeding in Wateringbury hit the headlines last month, with local newspaper reports and a camera crew from both ITV

& KMTV turning up, to interview David Merry, the village Speed watch coordinator and myself. In 2019, more letters were sent to drivers, speeding through Wateringbury, than Ashford, Canterbury and Dover combined!

I then contacted Kent Police Road Policing Unit, with the speed watch data, and managed to get two visits to the village over two weekends. I appreciate that weekends are not necessarily the best time to catch offenders, but it is better than nothing, and I hope that now, with the media interest, we can keep the momentum up, and keep pressurising both KCC and Kent Police to provide us with the support and speed reduction measures that we so clearly need. I attended a meeting of the Parish Partnership Panel, where representatives from Kent Police, Kent Highways and others were present, and again raised the problem of speeding and the perceived lack of support from all parties in trying to reduce these incidents. It is simply not good enough to have to wait for a fatality, in order for these bodies to act!

There are over 250 signatures on the petition to get the speed limit on Bow Road reduced to 20mph. You can find the petition at The Handy Store, and at the Post Office. If you haven't signed it yet, please do? Your support is vital in getting important changes made.

The funds to create a living wall at the crossroads have been raised, thanks to a very generous donation of £5,000 from Mr Fergus Wilson. This is being delivered through Wateringbury Village Hall, to whom the donation was made, as they are a registered charity. So watch as the Community Air Quality Gardens take shape, and if you want to join the team of volunteers needed to create this great addition to the village, then please let me know? <u>Sarah.hudson@tmbc.gov.uk.</u>

#### WATERINGBURY SPORTS AND RECREATION ASSOCIATION

#### Wateringbury Community and Sports Building Proposal.

This is a short introduction to a Proposal in Progress for a new Community and Sports Building in the Wateringbury Playing Fields. What began as two separate extension ideas for the Wateringbury Sports and Recreation Association and the Scouts and Guides, has evolved into a new eco-friendly green building for shared use for the whole community. Enthusiastic support for the project has been expressed by the Primary School and Church representatives. The Proposal is for a 28m long, single storey contemporary structure, that utilises renewable energy with solar power, a green roof and contemporary cladding to blend in amongst the trees in the overflow car

park area. The building will provide a much needed public toilet, changing rooms, kitchen/bar and a large multipurpose hall. We also propose a volunteer run cafe for teas, coffees and soft drinks during seasonal months, with picnic tables overlooking the playing fields, an outside tap and dog bowls.

The building has been designed to Sports England Guidelines. Regarding the architectural features of the building : The door and window apertures share the timber coloured bars as both security and aesthetic appeal, with maximum natural light given to the Main Hall from above. A low flat green roof with Sky Lanterns will also offer an overhang all round for Shelter and deterrent for climbing on the roof. Security lighting and CCTV will be a requirement. We must emphasise that this proposal does not impinge on other village facilities, such as the Village Hall or Where Memories Meet. It is designed to cater for all ages for decades to come. Should Planning Permission be granted we will be looking for Government Grants that are available for Community Buildings that promote environmental design and offer soft landscaping and community exercise facilities. Fund Raising and Philanthropist donations will also be explored.

We currently have a small group of volunteers with professional skills donating their time for this venture but are a long way from achieving our goal. #### PARISH COUNCIL METING NOTES

#### February 2020

**Repairs** to the wall outside the Village Hall have been completed. The police have been asked if they had followed up information given on the damage to the wall. Repairs to the track to the playing fields have been delayed due to bad weather.

**Members of the Council** are due to meet with KCC to discuss a Highways Improvement Plan **Two speed surveys** in the village were requested and paid by The Parish Council

A War Graves Commission sign is now displayed at the entrance to the cemetery.

**KCC Councillor, Matthew Balfour** advised that the KCC is keen to implement strategies intended to reduce the county's carbon footprint. He asked if the Parish Council wanted to accept his offer of a moveable speed sign. The offer was declined as the Speedwatch Group would be unable to move the equipment around the village, plus storage would be a problem. The Parish Council wants to replace the fixed speed sign at the junction of Canon Lane and A26. A request was made for the KCC Councillor to pursue the repair of the A26 road surface from before Danns Lane towards Pizien Well Road.

**Borough Councillor, Sarah Hudson** advised that she had been interviewed by local media about speeding in the village. She contacted Kent Police and this resulted in a traffic police presence by the railway station and on Red Hill during some subsequent weekends. In 2019 the number of vehicles speeding through the village exceeded figures supplied in the Ashford, Canterbury and Dover areas combined. A petition to put a 20 mph speed zone on Bow Road has attracted 250 signatures and is still available in the post office. Planters have been set up by the Welcome to Wateringbury sign, filled with compost and planted up.

**Crime report:** the format has changed. The new monthly newsletter does not cover Wateringbury. Cllr Hudson has been asked to investigate as information which is obtainable on the Kent Police website is usually out of date.

**The Council had made enquiries** of their insurance provider to ask if volunteers would be covered to carry out repairs to the Stocks near the village hall. The requirements were involved and it was felt the cost to insure would outweigh the quote received for £170 from Chris Chaplin. It was agreed to accept the quote.

**The possibility of creating a "living wall"** at the crossroads was discussed (i.e. planting an area in the ragstone wall with hairy-leaved plants that attract particulate matter). Cllr Hudson stated the village hall had received a donation of £5000 towards the cost and asked the councils permission to put this on the ragstone wall. This was agreed and arrangements would be made to remove the ivy from the wall

**Plans for the new proposed sports pavilion** in the playing fields are moving forward. The committee has been urged to obtain clarification of the lease by a legal adviser.

An inspection report on streetlights in the village indicates that extensive repair is required, largely due to vandalism. Many lights also need to be replaced with LED fittings. A meeting would be arranged with the contractor to discuss the report further.

The Council praised the Speedwatch Group Co-ordinator for his article in the Kent Messenger.

The Village Warden reported that the rubbish bin in the basketball court area of the playing fields has still not been replaced and Cllr Hudson will chase this outstanding matter with TMBC. Bus stops have been cleaned of graffiti recently.

During the public session it was brought to the attention of the Council that **bicycles and horses had been using footpaths in the area**. A suggestion was made to perhaps install some form of gate on the footpath that runs alongside Wateringbury Place The Council was thanked for installing the war memorial plaque in the cemetery. It was noted that the **Bow Road sign** has not been replaced after being damaged a year ago. There is a lot of **ivy** growing in the trees at the crossroads which needs attention.

A resident who had crossed the Tonbridge Road near the Post Office and tried to gauge traffic flow using the traffic lights without pressing the pedestrian light button, warned that this is not safe for pedestrians.

#### **Planning Meeting - Applications**

**Coppice Count, 70 Teston Road** – erection of building for indoor dog training. This application appears to be an attempt to address issues relating to the earlier application refused by the LPA and subsequently dismissed at Appeal. Whilst the size of the proposal has been reduced, it is, in the opinion of the Parish Council, still an unacceptable size and mass. This, together with the reasons for objection by the neighbours, with which we agree and fully support, is our considered opinion and we object to the application and ask that it is refused by the LPA.

Mulberry Cottage, 230 Red Hill – demolition of existing barn and erection of 3 bedroom dwelling with integral double garage. All previous comments on TM/19/01993/FL (Conversion and extension to existing barn to create a 3 bedroom dwelling with integral double garage) remain the same for this application TM/20/00003/LB 59 Bow Road Listed Building consent: replace timber in ground floor window. Comment: no objection

#### **A VIEW FROM THE PEWS**

#### Wateringbury from above

Imagine a fixed drone with a video camera high above the crossroads in Wateringbury filming a 24-hour period. Playing it back at a speedy rate would reveal the ebb and flow of movement, in, around and through the village. First thing to be visible in the darkness of the early morning would be the lines of streetlights marking up a general shape of routes and the twice hourly movement of a line of coaches from the train zipping through. Gradually, lines of red rear car lights and front white lights build up, as commuter cars queue at the traffic lights. Sunrise illuminates the landscape, creating long shadows in the west, glowing house sides in the east, and a shining silvery surface of the river flowing past the southern reaches of the village.

Like ants far below, human and dog combinations slip quietly onto the footpaths and walkways for morning constitutionals. There is activity in the horse-fields as feeding and early morning necessaries take place and farm tractors can be seen moving onto fields surrounding the built up area. Flocks of birds, swans and geese wake up and start to splash about disturbing the water. Dark bag carrying and uniformed dots become visible moving from house to car and clustering at bus stops. The uniformed bag carrying dots are hoovered up by the stopping oblongs of buses. Then the great crescendo begins. Prams, smaller tottering infants, in clusters of families, and the yellow chains of walking lines from the nurseries would indicate, as they close in from all angles swarming around primary school.

Suddenly, all these small people would disappear inside the large blocks of the school building, leaving a trace membrane of expanding dispersing lines and clusters of adults zipping off in different directions. There will be two or three more sudden swarms of small dots flooding out into the surrounding field and playground as break and lunch time happens.

Now across the whole village, our drone's-eye-view reveals a different pattern of movement. Fewer cars and a different mix on the pavements. Joggers, slower moving dots as a different generation emerge into the public spaces to and from shops, hairdressers, village hall and up at the Church and cafes for coffee mornings, lunches and afternoon teas. A steady flow goes in and out of the surgery. The odd boat passes by, leaving a long pattern of arrows in the water behind. Folk with fishing rods settle along the banks. At the garage and the boatyard workers pull respective automobile or cruisers in and out of working spots. The odd lawn changes colour as the mower cross it from side to side in a number of houses. Groups periodically gather and disperse near the village hall, as events take place, classes meet and conclude.

The cycle of the great gathering of the prams and families occurs again as the huge outpouring of blue uniformed smaller persons would flood out into the playgrounds and find their adults and routes home. After school, lines would drift to after school classes and later, as the sun sets, smaller groups would be seen leaving their houses and descending on the scout and guide HQ, the large lit windows of the village hall, and also the village pubs and the club.

As darkness returns the lights of the streets and the waiting cars on the roads return. Lights come on around the many shapes of houses and homes across the village, as darkness settles and people return home. The Church is lit temporarily for an evening event. As night draws in all these lights would blink out, gradually sending the village back into darkness section by section. Finally, the lines of streetlights and the odd vehicle and flashing blue of an ambulance are visible, with an occasional snake of lights of train, and a watery full moon gleaming up from the river. How blessed we are to live here.
