## JULY PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Co-option of Councillor At the start of the meeting Steven Tickner was co-opted on to the council.

**KCC Councillor Matthew Balfour** spoke about traffic congestion at the cross roads. He took questions from members of the public who were concerned with the speed of traffic on the Tonbridge Road as well as the merits of filter lanes at the traffic lights. Suggestions were made from councillors and public regarding traffic flow, speed and pollution levels.

The chairman proposed the reformation of a Parish Highways committee to deal with all traffic and highways related concerns. Councillors agreed and the members will be Steven Tickner, David Marks, Dennis Stones and Lyn Simons.

**Crime Report** Between 2 and 22 June the following crimes were reported in the village: a road rage incident at the traffic lights resulting in an assault, fuel siphoned and windows smashed on several coaches parked in Danns Lane, possession of a controlled drug, a vehicle had its rear window smashed and a wing mirror removed in Bow Road, a bad driving incident which caused a cyclist to swerve on Tonbridge Road and an object thrown out of a car window hitting another vehicle causing the windscreen to crack, a vehicle seen driving on to the playing fields with other males seen to approach. There were also several RTCs along the Tonbridge Road and one in Livesey Street.

**Friends of Wateringbury** Volunteers had worked recently in the village and collected 32 black sacks of leaves, weeds and rubbish from Tonbridge Road near the bus shelters and the lock-up area. Councillors expressed their thanks for this community effort to improve the village environs.

**Playing Fields** Following a request councillors voted to provide a design of swing seat which is suitable for children of all abilities to use. At the public discussion time concerns were raised about the speed of vehicles using the track down to the facilities and unsocial behaviour in the evenings, which the police have been asked to monitor.

A meeting had been held with the Sports and Recreation Committee about the insurance of the Sports Pavilion Councillors agreed to put to the Association a suggestion they pay 50% of the premium.

**Speedwatch** During June 19 one hourly sessions took place during which 4827 vehicles passed by. There were 508 speeding vehicles and 7 vehicles being driven untaxed.

The chairman expressed the council's appreciation of the work of the volunteers. A request was made to borrow the parish Speedwatch equipment to count the number and speed of vehicles on the Tonbridge Road for lengthy periods. It was stated users would need training and they would not be covered by the police insurance. The Council felt that Speedwatch already carried out adequate monitoring

**T & M Local Plan** (which sets out planning strategy for the next few years). Central Government had instructed T & M to revisit the plan and find sites for an additional 630 new homes.

Councillors expressed deep concerns about the infrastructure and traffic implications of the recent purchase of Broadwater Farm (which borders East Malling and Kingshill). Berkley Homes' plan is to build 1100 homes and a primary school.

**Village Hall** The T & M pollution monitoring equipment had been installed in the porch of the hall and would be insitu for about a year. The chairman thanked the hall trustees for their co-operation.

**Planning Committee** Councillors considered the following applications:

Demolition of existing barns and erection of log cabin for B1(a) office use with associated parking at Home Farm, Red Hill. Council had no objections

Single storey rear extension at 1 Tonbridge Road. Councillors had no objections provided neighbours were happy. **Public Question Time** Members of the public raised concerns about:

Brambles and Ivy growing on the roof of the village lock-up.

The pressures on Secondary School places when at Kings Hill and other large developments primary schools were being built but there appeared to be no new Secondary Schools planned. Neither were cemeteries being provided

A member of the public referred to reports the signal box at the station would be boarded up when changes were made to the crossing gates and stated this was not the case.

The waste bins at the playing fields were overflowing.

The apparent inadequate responses of the police to reports of crimes within the village.

The next meeting is on Tuesday 4 September at 7.30pm in the Village Hall (upper meeting room).

### WAR NEWS, SEPTEMBER 2018

- 12: first large scale offensive on Western front by American Expeditionary Force.
- 23: British occupy Haifa and Acre in Palestine.
- 29: British retake Messines and Passchendaele on Western front.

After three months with no war fatalities for Wateringbury, Corporal **Ernest James** was killed near Ypres in Belgium on 5<sup>th</sup> September, nearly a month into the British army's 100 days advance. The war diary of his battalion of The North Lancashire Regiment records for that day that they experienced "Intermittent enemy shelling with lachrymatory & mustard gas" with 3 "Other Ranks" (i.e. not officers) killed.

The Kent Messenger reported his death as follows: A regular soldier for 11 years, 8850 Corpl.James was the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. James, of Wateringbury, and 35 years of age. Much sympathy is felt for his aged parents, who received the news of their sad loss in the following letter: "With the deepest regret I inform you of the death of your son, Corpl. James, who fell gallantly doing his duty during an advance on the 5th. He was a most valiant soldier and much loved by his men and fellow soldiers. His comrades buried him close to the spot where he so bravely laid down his life for his country, and the burial service was read over his grave and a cross erected. We, his fellow soldiers, offer you our most heartfelt sympathy in your great trouble, in which we fully share." He is now re-buried at Wulverghem-Lindenhoek Road Military Cemetery which is 13 km south of Ypres, one of 1,010 Commonwealth graves there.

Edward Jenner, from Teston but well known in Wateringbury, helping his father as a general carrier, was seriously wounded in late August and a graphic letter describing how he came to be wounded was published in the Kent Messenger in September.

The 100 days advance saw the Military Medal (MM) for "fine leadership and marked initiative... displayed on September 29th-30th during the operations near Comines" awarded to Sergeant Mathew Relf. Matt attended Wateringbury School and had been working in the Leney brewery as a ledger clerk until 1916 when he joined up. The MM was an honour ranked after the Distinguished Conduct Medal (DCM) and over 115,000 were awarded during the war.

The 100 days of the final advance saw nearly as many British losses in total as at The Somme, and even more if measured daily. Wateringbury's losses were much lower than for The Somme. The home front was not completely

brutalised by the war: Christopher Eaton, from London was prosecuted at Malling petty sessions in September and fined one pound for "cruelly ill-treating a certain animal to wit an ass, by working it in an unfit state at Wateringbury."

Although many women moved during the war out of domestic work into better paid jobs, Mrs Brocklebank of Wateringbury Place was advertising in September for a second (of three) housemaid. Previous experience was necessary and a further requirement was that applicants be a "Church woman".

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#### Residents urged to complete electoral registration form as soon as possible

Households in Tonbridge and Malling have been sent an important electoral registration form to fill in, as the Borough Council carries out the annual process of updating its Register of Electors.

Residents must be registered to vote in order to be able to vote in future elections or in any referendum that may take place. Every household must complete the form, even if they have voted in recent elections. The form has been delivered to all homes in the borough.

The form is easy to complete – if the details already printed on the form are correct and you don't need to make any changes, you can tell the Council online or by telephone (landline calls are free) or by text message using the details on the form. If you do have changes to make, you can respond online or by completing and returning the paper form you have received. You can also let the Council know if you would like to vote by post.

Julie Beilby, Electoral Registration Officer and Chief Executive of Tonbridge & Malling Borough Council, explains the process: "Completing the Household form is extremely important because we need to know who is living at your address so we can help ensure that they are registered to vote. We don't get this information from council tax records or from any other organisations so we need to hear from you, even if you have voted in recent elections. So, please complete your form as soon as possible and make sure you don't 'lose your voice' at future elections. Each response we receive now will also save the Council money, as we won't need to send you a reminder, helping us to work in the most efficient way."

## Dear Reader

Looking out at the vicarage garden at the brown and parched lawn and the flower beds filled with wilting and, to be honest largely dead or dying flowers, it struck me that we need to be very careful what we wish or indeed pray for as the outcomes are not always the ones we might have hoped for. The topic of the weather is a standard subject of conversation for the British, it's a safe ice breaker when meeting strangers and more often than not we express our wish for good weather during the weekends or the holiday periods. Well this year we certainly seem to have got what we wished for. Record high temperatures, blazing sunshine day on day, perfect weather for gathering the harvest, perfect weather for the school summer holidays, perfect weather for simply doing nothing if indeed you have the opportunity to spend the day doing nothing. But for those of us who have to work, for those who are unwell or confined to their beds, for those who have difficulty breathing, for animals and for many of the elderly, the weather wasn't quite so glorious. Those with chest problems have difficulty breathing in the humid air, dogs die in hot cars, stubble baked dry by the sun catches fire very easily, water shortages begin and hosepipe bans are imposed. What is good for one group of people isn't necessarily good for every group of people.

So, it is with life in general. We cannot live our lives motivated only by the idea that what is good for me is good for everyone or what is good for me is all that counts. Life truly lived in Jesus Christ teaches us that we live in community, we have a duty of care (to use a modern phrase) for those around us and for the places and communities in which we live. What we do has an effect on others and what they do and say has an effect on us and the communities in which we live.

So, enjoy what remains of the fine weather but be aware of those around you. Is there someone who needs your help as they suffer in the heat, are you using water without thinking about the consequences, do your animals or ones in your garden need extra shade, shelter or water? We live in community not only with our families but with everyone around and indeed in the world in which we live. We can only expect to be cared for in our time if we are willing to care for the things and people around us, we forget that at our peril.
