TESTON AND WATERINGBURY PRESCHOOL

We have been very busy learning about minibeasts this month. This links to our topic book 'Twist & Hop Minibeast Bop' written by Tony Mitton. The minibeasts are gathering to dance the night away! But who is missing from the fun ...will the snail make it?

We have made symmetrical patterns for our butterfly pictures and used sponge stamps and black paint to create Ants. We have also used our fine motor skills to thread pipe cleaner legs into an Ant template; making sure that we have given our Ant the correct number of legs! We have played 'hunt the spider' in our tuff tray.

We have been using magnifying glasses and microscopes to look for mini beasts in our garden. It is very important to care for the natural world and we have encouraged our children to get involved by creating a wormery; the children were able to bring in worms from home. We also talked about the importance of bees for our planet; we made honey sandwiches which all the children enjoyed. We are also caring for caterpillars; Stitch, Colin, Munchy and Connie (named by the children). We have watched them munch, turn into pupas and now they have turned into butterflies which we will set free. The children have been really interested checking their progress every day. We have a large garden and as the weather is improving, we are spending more and more time outside. We have had a soft play 'obstacle' course. We have made a track for our trikes using road signs and a construction site using diggers, 'cement mixer' and blocks. Sand play, mini beast hunts and musical instruments. The fun and learning go on and on. We are looking forward to the weather getting warmer so we can have our lunch under our cherry tree in the garden.

WATERINGBURY PARISH COUNCIL - ORIGINS

The Church (particularly church wardens) had been given, from the 16th century onwards, many secular tasks to carry out on behalf of the central government. The Local Government Act,1894 mandated the creation of elected councils for all parishes with a population over 300. County councils had been created under an Act six years earlier.

Nationally the hope was that the creation of parish councils, as one MP stated, would *go to the very root of national life*. In Wateringbury this hope was reflected in the fact that for the 9 councillor positions there were 17 valid nominations, so an election was held. One Wateringbury councillor put a notice of thanks for his election in the South Eastern Gazette.

All the nominations were for men. Women who owned property were entitled to vote and stand in local elections, whereas they had to wait until after World War I to get the vote in parliamentary elections. In Wateringbury the first woman to become a parish councillor was Mrs Lemmens in 1919.

Parish property and charities had to be divided between the new secular council and the church. The village lock-up went to the new secular council, whereas the equally secular *Dumb Borsholder* was pragmatically kept by the church where it still hangs today.

Meetings of the parish council were held in the Girls' School, then located on Red Hill. An early topic on the council's agenda was the politically challenging task of objecting to Viscount Falmouth's enclosure of heath land at the top of Canon Lane, which would impinge on a public right of way.

The vicar of the time, Greville Livett, was clearly annoyed by the legislation creating the parish council. He felt that the need to hold an election was a needless expense and noted that Wateringbury's parish council accurately reflected the wishes of the parish by a policy of inactivity!

GARDENING FOR WILDLIFE

I saw my first bats of the season in early May, swooping and swerving up Mill Lane. These were likely to be pipistrelle bats as they are our most common species, emerging at sunset to chase down tiny insects.

To attract bats into your garden you'll need to attract the insects that they feed on by incorporating into your planting light coloured and/or night scented flowers: night scented stocks, evening primroses, nicotiana, honeysuckle, and oxeye daisies.

The flowers that attract night flying insects also work for our day time visitors and if you can add: verbena, lavender, cosmos, scabious, campanula for example, you will be rewarded with butterflies, bees and a range of other beneficial insects.

One of my favourite pastimes at this time of the year is watching the solitary bees gathering around my bee boxes. The most common visitors at present are mason bees but they should be followed in the summer by a range of others including leaf cutter bees and solitary wasps (none of these sting!) which act as a natural pest control, collecting flies, small caterpillars and aphids.

You can buy or make bee homes (details on KWT website) and then position them in full sun, at least a metre off the ground and somewhere that you can sit comfortably and watch them.

NEWS FROM WATERINGBURY SURGERY

A Neighbourhood Care Centre (NCC)

A NCC staffed by paramedics with prescribing authority, has been set up at Larkfield Health Centre, Martin Square in Larkfield, covering Wateringbury and other local surgeries. Its aim is to see on the same day patients with acute medical issues, such as new coughs, sore throats, ear pains, abdominal pains etc. that would traditionally have been seen at Wateringbury surgery. It will free up the surgery to see patients with complex and chronic health issues who need more support. When you contact Wateringbury surgery seeking an appointment, if your condition is suitable, then your appointment will be made with the NCC.

Klinik, the new triage system

The practice has switched off the Accurx triage system in preparation for the introduction of a new triage system called Klinik. It uses artificial intelligence, making for a much safer system.

Klinik is currently being set up and it is hoped to be completed within 4 to 6 weeks. More information will follow.

In the meantime to book an urgent or routine appointment, please call the surgery from 8.30am. If your request is for medication, medical certificates or other administrative enquiries, please email: gp.G82200@nhs.net. This email will only be open on a temporary basis until Klinik is live.

Questions

Last month I was listening to Bishop Simon, the Bishop of Tonbridge, and he was reflecting that during the Covid pandemic thousands of people were dying and, understandably, many questions were being asked and discussions had about end-of-life care. But there was precious little discussion about after-death care - and, important as it is, he didn't mean the care of the bereaved. Bishop Simon was touching on, what I certainly perceive to be a fact, that because a question such as 'Is there life after death?' cannot be answered with certainty there is a tendency to avoid thinking about it and having any discussion at all. Perhaps people feel unsafe about engaging in such discussions, frightened that their ideas and questions will just be put down. That is a great shame because a question like that is clearly very important.

And there are other big questions that for centuries have been asked but these days seem to be swept under the carpet: Who am I, why am I here, does God exist, etc.? They really are very big and very important questions and



I think it is right to discuss them. And so, I think it is right that the local church does what it can to create a safe, friendly, and welcoming place in which those who have such questions can come for discussion. To

that end we are running an *Alpha Course* in West Peckham Village Hall beginning on the 7th of June. It runs for eight weeks from 7PM to 9PM on Wednesdays and each evening includes a light meal followed by a video presentation and then an opportunity to talk. The topics include: 'Is there more to life than this'? 'Who is Jesus'? 'Why did Jesus die'? 'How can I have faith'? 'Why and how should I pray?' 'Why and how should I read the Bible'? and 'Who is the Holy Spirit?' There are 8 sessions in all, it is free and it's OK to give it a go but then stop if you realise it's not for you. Clearly, it's looking at the big questions from a Christian point of view but for many, who have had Christian teaching as children, that's not a bad place to start. And those with a different faith and non-faith upbringing may be curious about what Christianity is all about. So, if

you've ever found yourself asking some of life's big questions or are just curious to find out more about what Christians believe then the *Alpha Course* is for you. There are some good free examples of this on BBC Sounds with 'Ambient Focus.' You can find it on the BBC Sounds website - search for it in the search box. Ambient focus is a collection of slow and calming soundscapes and music especially chosen to aid focus. I find it good with my headphones on but that's up to you. The idea is that this background soundscape makes it easier to stay focussed on what you want to do, and less distracted.
