GREAT NEWS FOR THE CHILDREN OF OUR VILLAGE Wateringbury Parish Council is delighted to announce that they will be receiving a grant of £57,833 from the FCC Community Foundation Action Fund* to put new play equipment into an extended play area on the Queen Elizabeth II Playing Fields. The grant will pay for new swings and springies, a roundabout, a see-saw, a play panel and a modular multi-play tower, for the younger age groups. This is in addition to the grant of £8,717 received recently from the National Lottery Community Fund. This funding is for the existing play area to be enhanced in the coming months by adding junior swings, two springy sheep and a play panel for children of the village to use and enjoy.

GARDENING FOR WILDLIFE

Firstly, apologies that there was no article from me last month but I was in Mexico observing some very different wildlife, including manatees, snakes, monkeys, crocodiles, iguanas and spiders/tarantula! It's a bit of a shock to the system being home but despite the cold temperatures, the increase in daylight hours has triggered clear signs of Spring. These are particularly apparent in birds as the males fight over the females and then the pairs search for nesting material. Much of the material they choose will be natural such as twigs, lichen and moss but some, such as Long Tailed Tits, will also use other materials if available and it's interesting to put a small selection in a suitable spot to see what they choose; human hair is a favourite! Toads and Frogs are also on the move, making their way back to their original ponds so do look out for them on the roads. These creatures are good friends to gardeners as they eat slugs and snails and although we associate them with ponds they spend most of the year out of the water in damp dark places so if you can find a suitable spot to construct a small log pile, you may attract them into your garden regardless of whether you have a pond or not. I already have toad spawn in my pond so there should be plenty of tadpoles on show in time for my

MARCH PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Election of Parish Councillors - Elections are scheduled to take place on 4^{th} May for those wishing to serve on our Parish Council. There are 9 vacancies. Those wishing to enhance our village by becoming a Parish Councillor need to submit their applications by 4pm on 4^{th} April to T & M Borough Council Elections Officer. If less than 9 applications are received those applying, who meet the criteria, will automatically become Parish Councillors. Elections for T & M Borough Councillors will also take place on 4^{th} May.

Sarah Hudson reported on TMBC matters and gave a snapshot of the good things that have been happening in the Borough: TMBC Council Tax increase - Our portion of the Council Tax for 2023/24 is to increase by 3% equating to £6.73 for a Band D household.

<u>Grants</u> - West Kent Business Support Grant is to be distributed during April 2023. The Football Foundation has provided £2m to T&M in support for Aylesford and Tonbridge Angels Football Clubs. TMBC, with some funding received through grants, has distributed £6m in

support for vulnerable residents via various projects during this financial year.

<u>Climate Change Initiatives</u> - 56 solar panels were recently fitted to the roof of Larkfield Leisure Centre. 100 additional Electric Car Charging Points are to be installed across the Borough.

<u>Crime</u> - The Borough continues to have the lowest crime, antisocial behaviour and fly-tipping figures in Kent. The OpAssist project has seen a 17% decrease in fly-tipping. Six mobile CCTV cameras have been granted for use within TMBC. Sarah has requested use of one or two of them, however the locations are not to be publicised in order to maximise their effect.

<u>Good spaces</u> - Both Leybourne Lakes and Haysden Country Park have received accreditation recently for being amongst the top three open spaces in the country.

Allotments - Councillors approved, with minor amendments, the new Annual Agreements for renting Old Road Allotment plots.

Christmas Light Decorations - Confirmation of costs to fix lights to street lamps near the cross roads was still awaited from KCC.

Crime Report - Two crimes were listed on the police website - the theft of a mobile phone from a shop and loss of a mountain bike from Red Hill.

Defibrillator - The machine on the wall of the village hall is at present out of action. It is hoped it will be operational soon. The Clerk has ordered notices which will be placed around the village giving details of its location.

Drayhorse Meadow - Councillors had met with the present leaseholder of the stables and land who expressed a wish to renew the lease. Problems with cars parking across the access gate on football match days are still being experienced. Councillors agreed the tenant could submit ideas to prevent this happening for them to consider. Some of the boundary fencing needs to be repaired and the Clerk was asked to obtain quotes. The tenant also requested that the overflow car park which adjoins the meadow be locked on non-match days.

Finance - £250 had been received from NatWest Bank as compensation for poor service. Lionel Robbins was appointed to internally audit the accounts.

Sequencing of Traffic Lights - it was reported that KCC had accepted that there was a problem with the sequencing which causes a build-up of cars on Bow Road coming from Nettlestead. Solving the problem needs the road at the junction to be dug up. Equipment can be fitted to the traffic lights to monitor cars jumping the lights.

Parcel of land in Bow Road - The small area of land close to the footpath in Bow Road was discussed as concerns had been expressed about its condition. The land is owned by the Pear Orchard consortium of residents. It was suggested that the Community payback team could be approached to tidy the area up. The pavement has also been narrowed by a build-up of soil. It was agreed this was a matter for the KCC who are responsible for the state of the pavements.

Public discussion time

A resident voiced concerns about the bus stop shelter on Tonbridge Road which had been in a state of disrepair for several months. She had phoned the bus company, KCC and T & M Borough council and each had disclaimed responsibility and suggested she try another organisation. One had referred her to the Parish Council as the responsible authority. Councillor Hudson said it was the responsibility of KCC and repairs were scheduled for the end of March.

Starting in April it was agreed to allow members of the public to raise matters of local concern at two points in the general meetings. Firstly, at the beginning so that those who were not able to attend the whole meeting could raise their concerns then leave and, secondly, just before the close of the meeting so that members of the public could comment on matters which had been discussed during the evening.

Speed Watch - Volunteers carried out 11 sessions during the past month. 2,831 vehicles passed the check-points 285 of which were speeding. From Lodge Close 7.68% of vehicles travelling west were speeding and 10.04% travelling east. In Red Hill travelling downhill 16.44% of vehicles were speeding and uphill 8.92%. The chairman thanked the volunteers for helping to keep our village roads safe.

Planning Applications - the following were discussed at the meeting which followed the General Council meeting:

<u>Claremont House, 200 Tonbridge Road</u> conversion of loft space into one residential unit. This month the application, which came before the council in February, is for Listed Building Consent. *Councillors still object to this application and support all neighbour concerns.*Additional concerns were raised about parking and difficulties of carrying out major building works at a street-line property close to the traffic lights.

<u>Panyun Chow former Cromar Nursery, Livesey Street</u> redevelopment of former nursery with 4 detached houses. This application related to Conditions 11 and 12 of the previously submitted planning application and concerns site investigations about the condition of the land. *Councillors had no comments to make*

The next meeting of the Council will be in the village hall upper room on **Tuesday 4**th **April at 7.30pm**. Members of the public are very welcome.

The Freshness of Easter

Towards the end of February this year I was walking up Butchers Lane in Mereworth. I have quite a keen sense of smell and in the coolness of the early evening I picked up a beautiful, sweet scent. It was coming from some plants growing out of the bank. The plants were unfamiliar to me, and I took a picture to try and identify them when I got home. I discovered assuming my identification to be accurate! – that they were winter heliotropes. I'd heard the word 'heliotrope' before and was familiar with it in the name of the great Scott Joplin's Heliotrope Bouquet, but I'd never actually encountered the plant for myself, and I had no idea the fragrance was so lovely. It was a wonderful, fresh early promise of the delights of Spring, and I loved it. I shall be making a yearly visit to the lower end of Butchers Lane from now on to get a seasonal 'fix' of heliotrope!

Some people make a yearly or twice yearly visit to church and for those that do Easter is often the main one. I'm sorry that we can't offer four services across the Benefice again this year on Easter Day but there will be a service in all three parishes which is pretty good going for rural communities.

Easter, along with Spring itself, always strikes me as a time of great freshness and a glorious promise of the resurrection of all who receive Christ as Saviour and Lord. He is risen! The resurrection of Him who suffered and died remains the great bedrock of the Christian faith and the new life on offer to all through His death and resurrection brings hope, joy, peace, and a freshness to life. As with my heliotrope experience you may have heard of Jesus and the resurrection but

not experienced anything of either. I give you all a warm welcome to our services over the Easter period and look forward to seeing you.

LOOK AFTER YOURSELF – WELLBEING HINTS AND TIPS FOREST BATHING

We are lucky to have a number of woodland spots around. Forestry England encourages us to start forest bathing, a Japanese practice of relaxation (shinrin yoku). It is about being calm and quiet amongst the trees, observing nature around you whilst breathing deeply to de-stress and boost health and wellbeing. There is some science behind these practices as exposure to forests boosts our immune systems with as little as 30 minutes in the woods a week leading to measurably better outcomes. These tips come from Forestry England:

- Turn off your devices to give yourself the best chance of relaxing, being mindful and enjoying a sensory forest-based experience.
- Slow down. Move through the forest slowly so you can see and feel more.
- Take long breaths deep into the abdomen. Extending the exhalation of air to twice the length of the inhalation sends a message to the body that it can relax.
- Stop, stand or sit, smell what's around you, what can you smell?

Did you know that a number of National Trust Parks and Gardens offer mobility help for those who need it? On trips through wooded spots, I have enjoyed seeing both my mother and mother-in-law experiencing new freedoms zooming off ahead of their respective husbands.
