TRIBUTES

Mike Sandell 17th December 1937 - 21st October 2021

Mike was born in Norfolk and had a true love of the countryside. He passed on his horticultural skills latterly working at Hadlow College. Mike was a talented wood carver. He made children's rocking horses and carved exquisite models of birds which he painted. In retirement he cultivated varieties of hellebores and passed his wood carving skills on via a group at Tonbridge Baptist Church. His wise, positive thoughts uttered in his delightful Norfolk accent will be missed by his family and friends.

Paul Smart 23rd April 1943 - 27th October 2021

Paul was born in Eynsford and in his teenage years lived beside the bridge in East Farleigh where his family ran a cafe and small caravan site. He joined the Merchant Navy for a short time then became an apprentice boat builder in Yalding while at the same time developing his motorcycling talents. The owner of the business hoped that Paul would take it over but the pull of motorcycle racing was too strong. His talents meant he grew increasingly in demand to ride for major racing teams including Triumph and on his 29th birthday for Ducati at Imola, Italy; he won the 200 race and this put them on the map. In 2006 Ducati produced a limited edition Paul Smart motorcycle. He became the first UK rider to achieve racing success in the USA and he and wife Maggie lived in California. In 1978 he had a major crash while racing at Mallory Park and broke both his legs. On recovering from surgery he found that his feet had been reset straight (up until this time he had been pigeon toed!). He retired from major racing activity shortly after this and concentrated his efforts on developing a motorcycle sales business in Maidstone and then Paddock Wood. Upon retirement he became an ambassador for Ducati and attended many events in Europe and was looking forward to celebrating the 50th anniversary of the Imola win in 2022. For the past two years Paul had been having ground-breaking immunotherapy followed by regular chemotherapy to treat skin cancer. He had just been given the 'all clear'. He was full of praise and gratitude to all the staff at the Oncology Unit at Maidstone Hospital.

Paul enjoyed sailing and qualified as an offshore sailing skipper, canoeing on the Medway, cycling and of course motorcycling. It was while out on his motorcycle that a traffic accident caused Paul's life to end so abruptly. He will long be remembered for his positive attitude, the kindness and help he gave to so many and for the amusing stories of events in his life which he shared.

GARDENING FOR WILDLIFE

Over the last month, the state of our planet has dominated the news. The hope is that governments around the world will take the necessary action needed to limit climate change but, as gardeners, we can play our part. At this time of year, we are tidying up our flower beds and raking up leaves. Much of this can be turned into compost or leaf mould and even the smallest garden has room for one of the 'dalek' bins or even a wormery. Along with garden weeds and grass cuttings, I also add spent bedding plants, vegetable peelings and other uncooked kitchen scraps (not meat) to mine and produce most of the compost that I need for my garden. If I do need to buy any, I make a point of asking for 'peat free' which is still not widely available although compost containing peat will be banned from 2024. Peat is formed over hundreds of years and its use is therefore not sustainable. It stores carbon which is released as carbon dioxide if dug up, contributing to greenhouse gases and is also a valuable ecosystem supporting a wide range of animals and plants. If we, as the customer, make our views known to the relevant retailers and growers it may well make a positive difference with a more immediate effect.

As I come up the lane past the pond, I invariably stop to watch the wildlife it supports. Last week I was rewarded by spotting a Kingfisher which was perched on the roof of a car also surveying the scene before flying off with a flash of turquoise across the pond. We live in a beautiful part of the country and we can all play our part to keep it that way. *Pauline Knutton*

NEWS FROM SARAH HUDSON OUR BOROUGH AND KCC COUNCILLOR

I attended a meeting of the Communities and Housing Advisory Board at TMBC last week and voted in support of TMBC adopting the "Community Trigger". Anti-social behaviour (ASB) is a major blight on modern life - loud music, dog poo, pavement parking, fighting, drug use, intimidation, litter and fly tipping, vandalism, abandoned cars..... the list is almost endless and effects most of us on a weekly basis. Residents too often feel their complaints fall on deaf ears. I fear they often do! The "Community Trigger" clearly sets-out the process residents can follow to get their complaints addressed and actions taken by the authorities independently reviewed.

Basically, if you have made three reports about anti-social behaviour regarding the same person (or group of people) in a six month period, and you are unhappy with either the police, landlord's or council's response, you can commence the "Community Trigger" process. This will result in a review of your complaints and the actions taken and appropriate remedial action necessary.

The important thing is when ASB occurs locally, you need to report it to the police (either using 101 on their online reporting tool which can be found at <u>https://www.kent.police.uk/.../ocr/af/how-to-report-a-crime/</u> You can also report it to TMBC or where applicable to the landlord. When you do so, keep a note of the time and date and any additional information, as if you need to commence the

"Community Trigger" you will need a history of events and actions taken.

Obviously ASB should not happen and those responsible should be held to account, but this is one small step in giving residents the right to be heard and their complaints reviewed.

Following the formal withdrawal of the Local Plan in July, Borough Officers have been working hard to consider ways of speeding up the rewriting process. They have told us that a new reconsidered Local Plan could be ready for the Inspectors in just 18 months. With that in mind they are carrying out a 'Call for Sites' exercise over a four week period beginning in the next few weeks. They have identified a new streamlined way of assessing the sites which will involve the hiring of Consultants. There will be an emphasis on using Brown Field sites first, then Green Field. There will though need to be an estimated extra 3000 houses, as required by the Government (going from 696 to 839 per annum), a 20% increase which should take the plan to 15 years past the adoption date. Having a Local Plan which identifies a 5 year land supply and that has been agreed by the Inspectors will leave us less open to predatory planning applications.

The Local Government Boundary Commission has published its draft proposals for changing the ward boundaries used to elect Borough Councillors to Tonbridge and Malling Council. This is to make more equal the number of electors each Councillor represents including taking into account population growth since the last review as well as sites where new houses have been approved. In addition the number of councillors is being reduced from 54 to 43, meaning the boundaries of all wards are changing. The proposals are for Mereworth, Wateringbury and East Peckham to become a 2 member ward. Kings Hill will remain the same, with 3 councillors, and Hadlow, West Peckham, Golden Green, Plaxtol and Shipbourne to become a two member ward, called Bourne.

You will have discovered a treat in your copy of *Rostrum* for this month. This year the usual Church Christmas Card features pictures painted by children from Wateringbury Primary School. We ran a Christmas Card Competition at the School and the winning entries were used for the Christmas Card. I and some people at the Church had to pick the winners and it was a joy to look through the twenty or so entries. It was an even greater joy to announce the winners at the school and give some prizes. I ran this competition for many years in my previous churches and I've realised over the years that children are able to take pleasure in the simple joy of achieving something and being recognised for it.

I think that's what ought to lie behind the giving and receiving of presents. In my opinion, giving the present ought

to be a way of showing that we acknowledge another person and that they are valued; and in receiving a present we should take it as a token that we are valued. I think this is why it's so hideous when we see a gift received ungratefully or when there's an excess of gifts or huge sums of money spent on getting someone 'what they want.' It seems to rob the whole act of that simple pleasure of acknowledging someone and being acknowledged. We can 'spoil children' – and adults too! As human beings we ought to value relationships and regard them as precious gifts and our characters are spoilt if what we cherish is the gift rather than the relationship with the giver.

And so, I believe, that's how it is between us and God; we cherish the gifts the creator gives (he made the world and gives us life and breath and everything else) but we do not cherish the relationship with Him as the giver. This is why Christians speak of Jesus as God's gift to us because Jesus Christ, we believe, is God incarnate (God as a human being) and so in Christ we have God giving Himself to us - *Himself* is what He wants us to have. He would have to die and rise again for us as part of taking on our nature but it was all so that we could become the children of God and enter into the joy of knowing Him and being known by Him.

I do hope that over Christmas each of us can receive afresh or perhaps for the first time God's gift of Himself to each of us and so go on into the New Year in the simple childlike joy of knowing He is with us and for us.

NOVEMBER PARISH COUNCIL MEETING NOTES

In absence of the Chairman, Cllr Michael Wells, the meeting was chaired by Cllr Patrick Gregson.

Joshua Vincent, the Local Police Community Support Officer (PCSO), attended the meeting with a colleague. He reported that Wateringbury was a quiet, low crime area, with a relatively low incidence of reported crime. However, motorbike joy riders in the area of Teston Road were a current problem. Fencing off the exit to Kings Hill to close their escape route from police chase was proposed. He recommended using *My Community Voice*, a messaging service to keep in touch with the local police. It allows the public and businesses to communicate with PCSOs and check local area crime updates and alerts. It is not for crime reporting. Crimes should be reported either by phone to 101, the nonemergency police telephone number, or 'Report Crime' on the website <u>www.kent.police.uk</u>.

A request was made for PCSO to occasionally patrol the playground area as well as the Wateringbury school approach at school times, where aggravation arises from parking on yellow lines. Cllr Owen asked for occasional 'popping in' at the Playing Fields as a deterrent to potential criminal activity.

Sarah Hudson, T&M and KCC Councillor informed the Council of the following:

- slightly **improved air quality data** at the Crossroads. The testing equipment is old and should be replaced.

- The number of **objections to limit the speed** to 40mph at the approach to the village between Pizienwell Road and Canon Lane increased to 13 and has to be referred to Joined Transportation Board.

A defibrillator will be installed in the Church on 6th December.
The donation of £1000 to the Wateringbury Football Club for equipment.

- **Meadow View Court** is temporarily closed to visitors due to a Covid case. The Chairman and Cllr Tripp would look at the Magna lock on the Playing Field gate. A **'No parking' sign** had been placed in front of the gate to the Fields.

Cllr Fielding & Cllr Tripp will obtain 3 quotes to move and redo the **equipment in the Playing Field** to create an integrated junior playing area. The fitting of **LED lighting** in the village has been completed.

A replacement for the **notice board** by the Village Hall had been suggested. The cost of the Teston notice board had been in the region of £4000. Due to the demand on surplus monies it was felt too costly

The Council has no objection to the proposed change of **the TMBC electoral boundary** linking Wateringbury, Mereworth and East Peckham and will respond to the Boundary Commission accordingly.

The Village Fete to celebrate the Queen's 70th Jubilee on 6th June 2022 cannot go ahead as previously suggested. Members of the Fete committee will be unavailable at the time to organize and attend the event. The Council is considering and looking for organisers of an alternative way to celebrate the Jubilee. (After the meeting an alternative date for the village fete was agreed. The new date is **Sunday 19th June 2022**). **Planning Committee Meeting**

The Council has no objections to the following planning applications:

Grass verge adjoining 115 Tonbridge Road-18.0m Phase 8 tele- communication Monopole C/W wraparound cabinet at the base and associated ancillary works

Pelican House, 6 Red Hill - install new boiler with the same size flue and condensate pipe run. (Pelican House is a grade II* listed property).

Grass verge adjacent 501 Red Hill - retrospective full planning application to create a commercial office and workshop space replacing former commercial building. No objection subject to neighbours' comments

Hillview, 101 Red Hill - two storey front extension incorporating loft conversion with side dormer. No objection subject to neighbours' comments

Grandsden Cottage, 248 Tonbridge Road - erection of a part two storey, part single storey side/rear extension following demolition of existing conservatory and shed. Replacement windows on existing house- No objections subject to neighbours' comments

21 Leney Road - dropped kerb to access driveway and moving of lamp post, no objection but lamp post should be retained. No objection but the PC would like to see the lamppost retained
