WATERINGBURY LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY HERITAGE DAY Saturday 9 September

Wateringbury is to have 7 Blue Plaques to mark those with Wateringbury Connections who have enhanced our world. A blue plaque guided walk will visit each property when the plaque will be unveiled by invited guests with connections to the plaque people. Meet at the entrance gates to Wateringbury Place on the Tonbridge Road opposite Love Lane to leave at 10.30am

The walk will end near the church at about noon where Ploughman's Lunches will be available. From noon to 4pm the church will host displays about the Blue Plaque people and properties and other items from the History Society Archive. Publications of local interest will be on sale. Refreshments and Cream Teas will be available for you to enjoy.

JULY PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The unveiling of the History Society's blue plaques will take place on Saturday, 9 September. All are invited to the celebrations. There will be an exhibition in the church on the same day.

Kent County Councillor Matthew Balfour advised:

- The Ofsted report on children's services was good.
- There are the usual finance and budget constraints.
- Local bus services continue to be an on-going problem over which the KCC has no control.
- Issues with the Wateringbury crossroads are continuing and protracted, although financial support for improvements are positive

Discussions on pollution levels at Wateringbury crossroads have been held between the Parish Councillors and Borough Councillor. Wateringbury crossroads is the worst in the Tonbridge & Malling area. Councillors are keen to support the installation of equipment to measure nitrous oxide levels and other data. There is only one set of pollution monitoring equipment in the Borough which at present is in Tunbridge Wells

The possibility of carrying out a traffic survey on main roads through the village were discussed. Recording strips could be placed on roads to measure weight, speed and number of vehicles using our road system and provide useful information to back up observations on congestion. Further investigation is needed to establish costs.

Pizien Well Road is being used as a cut-through by an increased number of vehicles in an attempt to avoid congestion at the Wateringbury crossroads. The Clerk is to contact Highways to say the Parish Council would support traffic calming measures in this area.

Crime reports during April 2017 : on/near The Orpines - 1 Criminal Damage, 1 Violent Crime; on/near Bow Terrace - 1 Burglary; on/near Tonbridge Road - 1 Burglary; on/near Danns Lane - 1 Violent Crime. In June the number plate of a vehicle was stolen from a parked vehicle on a residential drive way.

The old and damaged iron fencing on Bow Road has been attended to with regard to the dangerous aspect. Further work is required.

The pruning of overgrown trees near to the village hall will go ahead.

The Council would like to obtain any information on unmapped village culverts. It was suggested that perhaps KCC or Southern Water may have records.

Terms of Reference, timings of meetings and agendas are to be sought to allow Parish Councillors the opportunity how they can best add their experience to cover representation on outside bodies.

An application has been received from a Wateringbury resident who is willing to take over the running of Speedwatch. A formal response will be sent to this offer. More volunteers are required (please see separate article in Rostrum

During the public session the following matters were raised:

- Overgrown brambles obscuring the village lock-up.
- The former Speedwatch Co-ordinator advised that he still has equipment belonging to the Parish Council.
- A request was made for the Council to write to a letter of thanks on behalf of the parish to the former Speedwatch Co-ordinator.
- The Parish Council was asked why it has taken so long to repair the village signs. Quotations for work are being sought.

- The Council was asked who is responsible for the removal of out of date planning notices. These should be dealt with by an official of the Borough Council.

The following planning applications were received:

- Alterations to elevations and change of cladding material at 10 Upper Mill no objection.
- Part single/part two storey rear extension and internal alterations; proposed replacement garage at Gladia, 609 Tonbridge Road no objection.

COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH – LOOKING OUT FOR YOU

Speedwatch is a community group, acting for the Parish Council, but in partnership with Kent Police.

What do we do? We sit at the side of the road, in selected locations that have been identified and risk assessed by the police, and we record the details of any vehicles travelling at excessive speed through the village.

Statistics to ponder -

· Cars have been seen passing Lodge Close doing in excess of 60mph!

· One Saturday afternoon during a one hour session, on Red Hill, 63 vehicles passed doing 35mph or over!

• In 2016, Wateringbury returned the 3rd highest number of speeding motorists in Kent, with a total of 3,912 observations. The total for Kent that year was 34,669.

This initiative is all about education; we have no teeth, but all of our session reports are submitted to Kent police, and they then determine any action. Happily, many first time offenders do not appear on the lists again, and whilst there is quite a list of second time offenders, the number drops dramatically for third time offenders.

The more that we highlight there is a problem, the more likely we will receive a visit from one of the police camera vans, and they have all the teeth that are required.

Many of our members have been doing this for over ten years, but our number is small, and we cannot cover as many hours in a week as we would like to. It doesn't take a lot; if ten people could each offer one hour a week, we could double our cover. You don't have to be any particular age; just think about it, one hour a week (or more) of peace and tranquillity and all you have to be able to do is read half a number plate.

There is a small amount of basic training, which is done on-line and Kent police provides insurance cover for all participants whilst on duty.

WAR NEWS, SEPTEMBER 1917

September 2: First night time air raid on Britain 10: Kerensky takes control in Russia 20: Battle of Menin Road in 3rd Ypres campaign (Passchendale) 26: Battle of Polygon Wood, near Ypres

Despite the heavy casualties of the "successes" in the 3rd Ypres campaign (Passchendale), at Menin Road and Polygon Wood, Wateringbury suffered no fatalities in this, or any other sector of the war, in September.

On the home front the first night time air raid on Britain took place at the beginning of September, soon followed by one on London. In previous months we have seen the impact that fear of air raids had on the village, despite the fact it was not actually bombed in World War I. The September Leney Board meeting, decided that they should insure their extensive portfolio of pubs in the Chatham area against air raids.

Food concerns remain evident. They affected all, including the top echelons of society, but in a different way. The Viscount Falmouth lived in Mereworth but owned, as now, land in Wateringbury. The record of Malling Petty Sessions shows that, despite pleading not guilty, he was fined 4 guineas (£4.20 or about £400 in today's value) for breaching the Horses (Rationing) Order 1917. Possibly he was not personally affected by the food shortages, but his horses certainly were!

School had finished for the (hopping) holidays and a report was made in the village magazine on the progress of the school dinner canteen to the end of term. Unsurprisingly, given the vicar had been the driving force behind it, the report concluded that it had "so far proved a distinct success. Both parents and children appreciate it, and it has helped save literally hundreds of loaves of bread." The accounts of the canteen are published showing that over 10 weeks payments (at 2d. per meal) raised over £41, implying an average of 100 meals a day being served. Nearly £9 in subscriptions (and there were the voluntary contributions of time) had been received, with the result that the canteen had generated a surplus over expenses of £9. A village fete in the grounds of the vicarage (The White House, near the village hall) had been held at the end of August, featuring May pole dancing and various parades, including one on war work, "baby competitions" and a scouts display. The competitions were judged by wounded soldiers from the hospital at Barham Court, Teston, who attended along with their nurses.

The church organ had been professionally cleaned and repaired, at a cost of £21, and the Church itself, including the high beams, had received a thorough spring clean from volunteers of the congregation. "For the most part seat-holders scrubbed and polished their own pews." The result was that the Church was cleaner than it had been for many years with "an atmosphere that is really sweet to breathe (unless, as occasionally happens there is an escape of gas)".

Brothers and sisters in Christ,
